

THE TRUTH, NOT LIES, SHOULD WIN

Ex-Mayor Pipes, broadcasting over the local radio for A. W. Pipes, the candidate for mayor sponsored by Bert Anderson, left the impression that Mr. Pipes brought \$50,000 cash to Medford and purchased the Liberty building.

Earl H. Fehl, independent candidate for this office, published under the caption, "Who Owns the Liberty Building?" the title record of the property, showing the legal title in Pipes, but that there are two mortgages, one of \$30,000, the other \$18,000, as well as delinquent taxes against this business block.

In a recent political advertisement, the Citizens Committee, M. N. Hogan, chairman, published a certificate of the county clerk, showing a part of the record ownership, just what the "committee" requested of the clerk, to-wit, "that A. W. Pipes is at present the record owner of the above described property."

This ad closes with the remark: "We believe this definitely answers Mr. Earl Fehl's misstatements on the subject."

CLERK GIVES FULL STATEMENT

Upon request the county clerk has issued a full statement, which follows:

Document No. 992, Sheriff's Tax Certificate—1926 taxes are due and not paid.

The record shows no subsequent transfer has been made, and A. W. Pipes is at present the record owner of the above described property.

BAPTIST DISTRICT CONFERENCE HAD MEET THURSDAY

A district evangelistic conference with representatives from the Baptist churches of Ashland, Grants Pass, Klamath Falls and Medford was held in the First Baptist church yesterday afternoon and evening. The meetings both afternoon and evening were presided over by Dr. G. G. Laughlin of Portland, director of evangelism of the Baptist church for the state of Oregon.

In his remarks, Dr. Laughlin pointed out that one of the reasons for the slow progress of evangelism was, he believed, due to the lack of family worship and that only one family out of every twelve who professed the name of Christ had family worship in their home. He urged upon the Christian people to read their Bible—saying that if you would ask some people to look up the book of Colossians they would not know whether to look in the Old or the New Testament for it, we need to know our Bible. Some people don't even know what the Bible is. A father sent his son to get the book, and the boy brought Sears Roebuck & Co.'s catalogue. A church should be a real winning church, it was declared.

Dr. W. E. Henry, pastor of the First Baptist church of McMinnville spoke at length on evangelism. A covered dish supper was served with Rev. C. E. Dunham, pastor of the First Baptist church of Ashland, leading the devotional, after which Dr. G. G. Laughlin made a few introductory remarks. This was followed by a duet, "Face to Face With My Redeemer" sung by Mrs. Richie, soprano and Mrs. Nixon, alto, with Mrs. Kennedy at the piano, all from Klamath Falls First Baptist church.

Prayer at this time was offered by Rev. E. J. Dodson of Grants Pass Baptist church. Dr. Laughlin then introduced Dr. W. E. Henry who gave a very helpful and interesting talk on evangelism. The meeting closed with prayer by Dr. W. H. Eaton, pastor of the local church.

Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney has no such interest. He has honorably practiced medicine in Southern Oregon for the past 18 years, and is a highly respected citizen of Jackson County.

Before coming to Oregon, he performed the work of coroner in the district in which he lived in Montana, and will take into the office the experience thus gained.

In many instances, it is necessary to issue death certificates in those cases in which no inquest is held. By placing a licensed physician in the office, these certificates will be issued without any extra expense to the county.

Again in many cases, the District Attorney orders a post mortem or autopsy. If the coroner is a physician he can do this without the coroner paying for service, and the coroner will be qualified to testify in criminal cases.
