WASHINGTON BOYS LEAVE SHOTGUNS IN LIEU FINES

Locked up in the vault of Judge Taylor's court in the federal building are three fine shotguns, which the judge is holding as security until Lawrence Hawkins, William Gish and Carl Nelson, three young men from the state of Washington, pay fines of \$25 and costs each, on their pleas of guilty yesterday to being present in Klamath county in violation of a non-resident law. It is not known whether the 28 guns they killed, and had in their car, were confiscated.

It seems that as they were en route home from this hunt, Deputy Game Warden Barnhart of Klamath county, followed to Deputy Game Warden Roy Parr of this county to arrest them, and the latter officer caught the men yesterday before they had reached Ashland. Although they had California non-resident licenses for hunting they had no Oregon non-resident licenses. The trio were without cash to pay the fines, hence, the court's order to hold their shotguns as security.
