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Here's To The Press--- When It Is Right

The Republican County Central Committee has great respect for the power of the press—when it is right.

The Ashland Tidings, the only newspaper in Jackson County supporting Newton C. Chaney and this committee had no valid objections to the three newspapers in Medford opposing Mr. Chaney for district attorney, provided they will give his whole record. All three of the newspapers in Medford are supporting Mr. Chaney's opponent for district attorney; they are all supporting Ralph Jennings for sheriff. We believe that two of them are opposing Mr. Chaney to sustain the fiction of their political independence.

Committee Careful in Checking Records

This Committee frankly confesses to some partisanship, but it has spent a great deal of time and money running down records and checking them up in an effort to be fair in every statement made.

The intention of this committee has been to say little about Mr. Chaney's opponent or about Mr. Jennings, democratic candidate for sheriff, but to say a good deal about Mr. Chaney's fine record, but some of the things being published may force us to make a few remarks about Mr. Coddling and Mr. Jennings.

Not in Disparagement But for the Sake of Truth

What are just a few of the facts in regard to Mr. Chaney's opponent? He was admitted to the bar sixteen years ago; he has abandoned the practice of his profession twice in that period and taken non-professional jobs. In twelve years of practice, our search of the record shows that he has had only forty-one cases before the circuit court, all petty and unimportant—divorces, mortgage foreclosures, etc. Has he handled any criminal cases, or involved in intricate civil cases? Has he had any experience in law enforcement? If so, the records do not show it.

Many Cases Handled at Low Cost

What of Chaney's record. In the past three years and ten months Chaney's office had handled 1761 criminal cases in Justice Court; 112 criminal cases in Circuit Court; 36 civil cases and 6 Supreme cases, a total of 1915 cases handled by Chaney as district attorney; and this vast grist of cases has passed through Chaney's office at an unprecedented low average cost per case.

Chaney's Policy: "Keep Cases out of Circuit Court"

And these newspapers must remember that the work of the district attorney's office has increased enormously in the last three or four years and if it was not for Chaney's policy of threshing these cases out and securing complete evidence in each case, or securing pleas of guilty and going into the Justice Court with them, instead of into Circuit Court, the cost would have been many times greater.

If They Criticize Chaney, Criticize the Sheriff Also

But if these newspapers are going to challenge Chaney's expenditures it will be only fair for us to say that the Sheriff's office in one year, by agreement, received out of this prohibition fund a great deal more than its 25%. Furthermore, Mr. Chaney paid jointly to Paul and Lewis Jennings, the sheriff's deputies, \$954.10 for performing special prohibition work.

Let Us Have All the Facts

Did the newspapers that are claiming that Mr. Chaney exceeded his budget allowance find out some of these facts? Evidently not. If the newspapers will tell all the facts this committee will publicly commend them, but we believe that they are assuming a blindly partisan attitude in opposing Mr. Chaney and that they are not searching to find anything in the records that will lose votes for their candidates, Mr. Coddling and Mr. Jennings.

Chaney Has Unimpeachable Record

Mr. Chaney has an unimpeachable record for faithfulness, honesty and efficiency in the conduct of the district attorney's office. This Committee, individually and collectively, believes in him and we feel that the voters will reward him by re-electing him on November 6th.

Students of good government long ago reached the decision that the work of the coroner should be entrusted to one who has no financial interest in the funeral expenses of the cases referred to him.

Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney has no such interest. He has honorably practiced medicine in Southern Oregon for the past 18 years, and is a highly respected citizen of Jackson County.

Before coming to Oregon, he performed the work of coroner in the district in which he lived in Montana, and will take into the office the experience thus gained.

In many instances, it is necessary to issue death certificates in those cases in which no inquest is held. By placing a licensed physician in the office, these certificates will be issued without any extra expense to the county.

Again in many cases, the District Attorney orders a post mortem or autopsy. If the coroner is a physician he can do this without the taxpayers paying for service, and the coroner will be qualified to testify in criminal cases.
