FEHL USES RADIO IN HIS CANDIDACY FOR CITY MAYOR

The 45-minute speech of the stiff-necked independent candidate for mayor, Earl H. Fehl, who, despite his past overwhelming defeats, declares he will keep on running for that office until he is elected, broadcasted over KMED last night, was the usual style of address he has delivered in local campaigns for years past, only slightly less radical.

He ridiculed the present and previous city administrations as unbusiness like, inefficient, extravagant and self-perpetuating; abused the local daily newspapers as subsidized by various administrations and took veiled slams at A. W. Phipps, the regular candidate for mayor, who his backers declare was only induced to run after urgent solicitation by the leading business men and citizens of the city, and who never has been connected with any city administration of Medford in any capacity.

In short, Mr. Fehl's address purported to show that Medford is now, and has been for years past, in a very bad way for proper municipal government, and he offered himself as a panacea which would bring about what he says is a greatly needed reform.

Why, if elected mayor, he would give the Medford public an unbiased, impartial, unbossed, economical, efficient and "honest" business man's administration, and not a "business administration." He said so, himself, over the air waves last night, which were somewhat heated, in other words, Mr. Fehl promised to deliver the goods.

His address was so long that it would fill a page or more of this newspaper, and it would be an impossible task to condense it into reasonable space, and yet at the same time convey to Mail Tribune readers Mr. Fehl's ideas on how city officials should or should not function, so only a general idea can be given here of what he was talking about.

However misguided as to his facts, deductions and theories of city government, in the face of well known municipal facts, he

MISS CHAMBERLAIN BROADCASTS WORD FOR C. M. THOMAS

Favoring the candidacy of Judge C. M. Thomas, Grace H. Chamberlain, a member of the women's advisory committee of the Republican organization, talked from the Mail Tribune-Virgin radio station last night. Her remarks, in part, follow:

"If you, personally, were involved in a lawsuit, what type of man would you hope to see as the judge? Not all litigants are guilty. You would pray that your judge be fair-minded—a man of broad human sympathy and understanding."

"My listeners recognize these qualities as the distinguishing traits of Judge C. M. Thomas. You will read articles written by his adherents, articles by his opponents. His adherents would keep in office as judge of the first judicial district, an intelligent, competent, forward-looking Christian gentleman. His opponents believe that a change would be beneficial—especially beneficial to his opponents."

Everybody knows that Judge Thomas has a sense of fairplay. He has the judicial temperament, plus training and experience in his profession and his impenetrability of good breeding lends dignity to any courtroom.

"Knowledge of the technicalities of the law is necessary, but it is the spirit of the law that gives life. To win their cases, lawyers sometimes stress technicalities, overshadowing the true character of a case and its merits, and so defeat justice. It is so easy to mistake noise for intelligence. Opponents dwell on technicalities, dragged from obscurity only at election time to prove ignorance or malicious intent, instead of the ability to hasten legal procedure legally."

"Women admire good house-keeping, and that Judge Thomas has cleared away hundreds of cases which have littered the court dockets for 10, 12, 15 years, is another proof of his efficiency."

"The administration of justice is a human experiment and demands a judge with the judicial temperament instead of the political complex."

"We need dry leaders as well as wise leaders. Judge Thomas advocates strict enforcement of the eighteenth amendment, and he is personally dry."

"Since the salary of the circuit judge is paid by the state, there need be no local complaint of extravagance. It is a common custom and by order of the chief justice that judges are shifted to districts where the dockets are crowded; equally proper and common to arrange for exchange of judges when personalities or conditions might bias judgment. Would that the appointment of circuit judge were made by the chief justice and the political game at election time abolished."

"Happy family life is a pleasant background, a civic, and a social, as well as a personal asset. As the father of three sons, the fatherliness of Judge Thomas might be appreciated by your boy, some day."

"Not long since, a 10-year-old girl was called into court to give evidence. She was bewildered, terrified, and in tears at the loud, quick questioning of the lawyer. Judge Thomas leaned toward the little girl and said, 'Sister, you come and sit on my lap and see if we can understand this any better.' In his kindly way and in a conversational tone he repeated to the child each

Attention Citizens of Medford

Citizens, especially the new ones in our midst will be interested to know that ever since the water commission made its investigation and decided that Big Butte Creek and Springs was the best available source from which to obtain Medford's city water supply the Fehls and Rowleys have endeavored in every possible manner to keep the city from obtaining this water, even going so far as to bring a number of law suits against the city.

In the past five years they have brought the following two injunction suits against the city to enjoin Medford from obtaining this water.

- Oct. 11, 1922, Isabelle Rowley vs. City of Medford et al.
- April 21, 1923, Isabelle Rowley vs. City of Medford, Water Commission et al.

Being beaten in these injunction suits in which they tried to enjoin the city from obtaining this water they have recently brought two more suits, one for \$100,000 against the Eagle Point Irrigation District and the other for a quarter of a million dollars against the City of Medford as follows:

- Oct. 13, 1927, Isabelle Rowley and Arthur S. Rowley vs. Eagle Point District for \$100,000.
- Oct. 13, 1927, Isabelle Rowley and Arthur S. Rowley vs. City of Medford for \$250,000.

If he doesn't give up these suits, and as mayor, makes a settlement of the alleged Rowley rights, to part of which he has claimed to have an irrevocable assignment, who will make up this amount?

We do not know what interest Mr. Fehl has in these alleged "Rowley rights," though he has made the statement to the water commission, council and others that he has an irrevocable assignment of some interest in them, but we do know he and his paper have continuously opposed the water commission and council in obtaining this water for the city and building the new water system which the citizens voted.

Do you want to have your water rent increased and be taxed for this quarter of a million dollars, or whatever settlement Mr. Fehl, as mayor, may make on the alleged Rowley rights, to which he claims to have an irrevocable assignment?

MR. AND MRS. HOMEOWNER AND TAXPAYER, you have bonded yourself for almost a million dollars for this new water system, which you are paying for both in taxes and in monthly water rentals. Do you want to put Mr. Fehl and his associates, who are bringing these suits against the city, in charge of your city water system?

MR. FEHL, IF ELECTED MAYOR, WHICH WILL YOU DO? Turn your back on the Rowleys, whom you have claimed you will fight for in the courts and elsewhere to the last ditch

OR
Let the Rowleys take judgment against the city for a part or all of this quarter of a million dollars and saddle extra taxes and a raise in water rates on the citizens of Medford, who have already bonded themselves for almost a million dollars for the new water system?
