OREGON IS BEATEN

doms at the start, passed and pounded their way to a brilliant 10 to 0 victory today over the greatly-favored Stanford eleven.

As a mighty crowd of 80,000 chilled and thrilled as these two bitter rivals struggled, the Trojan carved into football records the first triumph in three years of a Southern California team over a Cardinal array.

The great epic saw the Trojans ward off an opening Cardinal offensive that hopelessly outclassed them; rally near the end of the second quarter to push over a touchdown and clinch victory with a field goal in the final period.

The opening period saw Southern California hopelessly outclassed by the bewildering battering of the juggernauting Cardinal machine, which, in almost continuous thrusts at the Trojan wall, accumulated seven first downs in the final minute of play.

Twice the doughty northerners came close to the Trojan's goal, only to see their scoring hopes flitter on the wings of costly fumbles.

The white-shirted warriors of Stanford continued their relentless onslaught of the walls of Troy in the second quarter, but the Trojans started a counter attack.

That marked the turn of the battle tide. Smashing through and over the Cardinal ranks the Southern Californians worked their way from deep enemy territory to cross the line for the first and only touchdown of the game. In the same period they headed off a Stanford scoring threat by recovering a fumble on their own three-yard line. Francis Tappan, defensive end, picked up the oval.

The sons of Stanford and the defenders of Troy saw-sawed up and down the field in the third period, and the final goal was kicked in the final quarter.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Nov. 3.—(AP)—Oregon State College ran over a stout-hearted football team from the University of Montana and swarmed the Grizzlies by a score of 44 to 0 in a conference game here today. The State college team used every form of football they had ever attempted and made it effective. Montana found itself halted in every effort to make a first down against the Orangemen.

OUR LAST WORD—PERHAPS!

A WEEK AGO the Mail-Tribune issued its recommendations to the voters regarding candidates and measures, and among the former we endorsed George Coddington, the Democratic candidate for District Attorney, solely on the grounds of superior abilities.

Naturally the Republican Central Committee did not like this action on our part and we came in for considerable "panning," which we expected, and against which we register no complaint.

But the Republican committee went further and proceeded to maintain publicly that, on the same grounds of efficiency, and with no regard for personal or partisan considerations, their candidate was superior to the one we endorsed, citing his record as convincing proof.

Well, obviously there the issue was joined, for it was upon our knowledge of that record, and our knowledge of the legal attainments of the Republican candidate, that we based our opposition.

So there was nothing to do but print certain facts regarding that record, and our interpretation of those facts, which we did in yesterday's paper, and then leave the final decision to our readers.

There are other facts we might publish concerning that record, including some statements given under oath by the present District Attorney. Those statements would certainly support our charge of inefficiency, which is the only charge we make. But we don't wish to stir up that mess again, nor do we believe it would be fair to Mr. Chaney to do so.

Because of the large amount of money the law turned into the District Attorney's office, and because of dissension and clerical confusion in his office, certain public suspicions were aroused, and, to stop this malicious gossip and clear his name, Mr. Chaney insisted upon a grand jury investigation. No doubt because of this confusion in the records, and the general chaos, due to inefficient administration, this grand jury indicted the District Attorney on several counts.

In the subsequent trial Mr. Chaney was absolutely cleared on all criminal charges, and we believe even Mr. Chaney will agree that we are perfectly sincere when we say we were glad of his vindication.

It would have been much easier in this campaign to have left the opposition to Chaney with his political opponents and the Democratic press. But rightly or wrongly, we happen to take our policy of non-partisanship, as far as local public officials are concerned, seriously. It is one of the few things, in politics, we do take seriously.

So, feeling as we did regarding Mr. Chaney's legal qualifications, and his record, as bearing upon his fitness for the job, we could not endorse him without being false to our political principles and false to ourselves.

The most frequent argument used by Mr. Chaney's friends against our taking this stand has been "Why oppose him? He is going to be elected any way." The logic upon which such an argument is based is undoubtedly that if a newspaper is convinced it is headed for a losing contest it will not go in.

This time-honored axiom of the practical politician is as false as many others. We know of no newspaper worthy of the name which, believing deeply in a candidate or an issue, will not fight for the one or the other regardless of the probable political consequences or the probable outcome.

The time has passed when people blindly vote, as any newspaper tells them to vote. But the time has not passed when people vote upon accurate information which newspapers give them.

When a newspaper gives that information, to which the voters are entitled, its responsibility ends, the responsibility for the results resting upon the people, who must determine the character of their government and pay its bills.

So, with this explanation, unless there are eleventh-hour claims or charges, which we feel it necessary to refute, our campaign, as far as local offices are concerned, ends. Now let the people decide, and whatever they decide is going to be accepted by this paper, as it should by all good citizens, on the sound democratic basis of Vox Populi, Vox Dei.

Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney

Students of good government long ago reached the decision that the work of the coroner should be entrusted to one, who has no financial interest in the funeral expenses of the cases referred to him.

Dr. Chas. T. Sweeney has no such interest. He has honorably practiced medicine in Southern Oregon for the past 18 years, and is a highly respected citizen of Jackson County.

Before coming to Oregon, he performed the work of coroner in the district in which he lived in Montana, and will take into the office the experience thus gained.

In many instances, it is necessary to issue death certificates in those cases in which no inquest is held. By placing a licensed physician in the office, these certificates will be issued without any extra expense to the county.

Again in many cases, the District Attorney orders a post mortem or autopsy. If the coroner is a physician he can do this without the taxpayers paying for service, and the coroner will be qualified to testify in criminal cases.

The Farming Business

Much has been said during the campaign about solving the farmers' problems.

The same hokum has been dealt out to the farmer that was handed to him twenty years ago.

The average politician thinks of the farmer as the fellow with long whiskers and a wheat straw in his mouth, that we have always seen in the funny pictures.

Every constructive business man who has given the matter any thought at all says that the farmers' problems can be solved only by the farmer.

The day laborer's wage problem was solved years ago by the formation of the Labor Union. More than 90% of the skilled laborers in the United States today are members of the Labor Union.

They pay regular membership dues and thus support the organization that, through its power and influence practically guarantees them good pay for their labor.

The farmer's problem of a fair price for his produce and 100% value for his dollar is not nearly so difficult a problem as theirs, for every individual farmer has some capital other than his labor.
