D. A. R. Awards Prizes
Good Citizenship Contest
 A very interesting program was presented at the high school assembly Wednesday, October 31. At this time the awards in the essay contest sponsored by Crater Lake Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution were made. The subject was, "Why We Should Vote." Mrs. G. Q. D'Albini, regent of the chapter, presented the prizes, making a short address. Helen Mathison won first place, Leonard Hayssen second, Rosie Corrier, third. The papers of Ethel Hogler were given honorable mention.
 Crater Lake Chapter, D. A. R., presents prizes each year in some form of contest to encourage interest in good citizenship.
 The judges in this contest were Miss Co from the Daughters of Union Veterans of the Civil War, Mrs. A. R. Clement from the auxiliary Spanish War Veterans, and Mrs. E. P. Merrick from the American Legion Auxiliary.
 The prize essays are as follows:
First Prize
 Did you ever stop to think that you, the voter, are responsible for the government of the United States? The voter has it in his power to make our government good or bad. If it is placed in the hands of bad men the people will suffer. It is put into a hands of good and capable men the people will be benefited. So it is up to you, the voter, to vote for the good man. The right of vote in the United States is given as a trust and should be used for the public good.
 Remember, you citizens, who are entitled to vote, that only those who actually cast their ballot have a part in the government of the country. You have no right to complain as to who is elected to an office, because you failed to do your duty to your country when you failed to vote and you must suffer the consequences.
 If you as a citizen fail to vote either due to carelessness or indifference, you do not count for or against the officials. You are not taking part in the representative government. You may as well be termed "cease baggage" because you are not a good citizen when you fail your country on election day.
 In the election every vote counts regardless of wealth, nativity or position in life, so vote you citizens and show your country and fellow citizens that you are interested in the welfare of your country's progress, for without voting there would be no progress.

 Why should one vote? What a question! It can probably be answered by anyone between the ages of six and sixty. Reasons why one should vote are in evidence throughout every day life. If one only has eyes to see them. For one thing, it is the patriotic duty of every American citizen to vote, for patriotism necessarily involves loyalty to the ideals for which our fathers fought and bled. It is my opinion that a person who rejects his privilege of voting is a traitor to the principles set forth by those great men who gave their all for the furtherance of liberty and freedom which we enjoy to such a high degree today.
 Invariably, when the votes of the nation are counted, there is a great difference in numbers between ballots received and the number of eligible voters. What does this mean? Simply that a great many of so-called American citizens are too lazy or lack sufficient interest in their own welfare to go to the polls and cast their ballot. After election is over, from all sides come outbursts of rage at the way in which laws are forced upon the people without their having a voice in the matter. A close investigation will disclose the fact that those who are wasting their breath in violent outbursts of oratory are the very same ones who lacked the ambition to vote either for or against the bill in question. Yet when the bill has been duly passed and has become law, these non-voters loudly declare that

their rights as citizens have been trampled. They deserve no consideration at all, as far as I can see, for it is due to the negligence of no one but themselves that the undesirable bill has become a statute over their heads.
 Consider, if you will, the inevitable effect this "don't care" attitude with regard to voting is sure to bring to this nation. If such practices continue, those who desire power are the ones who vote. While they are gaining power through their ballots, the non-voters are losing the power they could have and are in a sense becoming subjects to those who vote. This acquisition of power by one class of individuals, will, if continued, cause his great democracy of which we should be so proud to crumble and degenerate into that despotic state known as oligarchy.  Voting is a duty and a privilege which should not be lightly thrown aside.  Although these steady-going American citizens do not realize it, they are a deadly drag to reforming conditions. Their indifference makes possible the greed and corruption which they greatly abhor. They cannot or do not care to see that our forefathers have placed in their hands a weapon with which to realize the conditions in the United States with surprising ease and quickness. But until they realize the shirking part they are playing we cannot expect good to come from evil.
 If we would be good, loyal, honest American citizens, we must regard seriously the problem of voting. Today's choice of officials will lead to tomorrow's future. Shall we stand idly by and see unscrupulous men occupy positions of honor and trust? As loyal American citizens we answer no. With their life blood our forefathers bought this duty and privilege for us. We will exercise it judiciously and reverence it highly.

 After the business session in the morning a covered dish luncheon was served at which time several speakers from Grants Pass, Ashland and Medford made short talks in behalf of the candidates who stand for prohibition.
 "Faith of Our Fathers" was sung by the assemblage as the opening hymn for the afternoon session. The Crusade Psalm was beautifully rendered by Mrs. T. G. Helme. Mrs. Jillson of Ashland, in the form of a telephone conversation gave a realistic cross section of the activity in both places in the effort being put forth to get out the dry vote. Two Grants Pass ladies delighted with several campaign songs. Mrs. H. Hyant, president of the Jackson County Union, announced that National Prayer Day had been declared for November 5 by the national president of the W. C. T. U. Judge Thomas' Subject Was "Criminal Youth".
