BANNER CARD FOR FRIDAY'S SMOKER IN ARMORY ARENA

Under the auspices of the Medford Boxing commission, Medford and southern Oregon fight fans have another banner smoker in store for them with a 24-round card scheduled for next Friday night at the Armory, with Jack Wood as matchmaker and promoter.

Bringing in two Portland headline fighters, Eddie Cartwright, colored 155 pound slugger, and Bobby Vernon, 146 pounds, who appeared here to advantage in last Friday's smoker, the main event of 10 rounds promises to be filled with action. Cartwright two weeks ago won a headline event in a regular Portland Boxing commission smoker and is reported to be as fast as "greased lightning."

Frankie Warnecke, who won his fight last Friday in Medford in record time, will represent Portland in the semi-windup, in which he will fight Jimmy Weir, 148 pounds, of Klamath Falls. Warnecke next Thursday night fights the main event in a Lions' club smoker in Longview, Wash., and has been fighting main events up and down the Pacific coast.

Two four-round preliminaries will feature Jack Foley, 125 pounds, of Salem, against Poncho Villa of Manila, P. I., and Mickey Riley, 123 pounds, against Silvino Tomasco of the Philippine Islands.

VAN PORAT MEETS PAOLINO UZCUDUN N. YORK TONIGHT

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Otto Von Porat, Norway's contribution to the heavyweights, will have a chance tonight to demonstrate whether his punching power is all it's cracked up to be. The Norwegian meets Paolino Uzcudun, chunky Basque wood-chopper, in a 10-round bout at Madison Square Garden.

Otto has been gaily bowling over everything he has met in Chicago rings, but he has yet to battle anyone as tough as Paolino.

Paolino has met hitters before and outside of a grunt or two, the Spaniard never seemed particularly bothered by them. The chances are Von Porat will see more elbows tonight than he ever saw in one 10-round fight before. The experts think that if there is any wood-chopping done, Paolino will do it and are backing his opinion at from 5 to 5 to 2 to 1.

The semi-final brings into one and the same ring, Tiny Roebuck, Choctaw Indian behemoth, and Arthur Dekum, of Italy, who grows around 220 pounds. At that Dekum will be "conceding" about 20 pounds to Roebuck.

WILLIE HUNTER OPEN CHAMPION

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 5.—(AP)—"Wee Willie" Hunter is still the open golf champion of southern California as a result of successfully beating off the attack of Fred Morrison, long-driving Midwick County club professional, in a 36-hole playoff here.

Southern California's Trojans, their confidence increased a hundred fold by the victory over Stanford that surprised the west, have a non-conference game scheduled with Arizona next Saturday. Trojan hopes for the conference title hinge on victories over W. S. C. and Idaho and elimination of California by either of the latter's two remaining foes.
