STRONG WHEN RIGHT—WEAK WHEN WRONG

ONLY ITEM OF EXPENSE AT ISSUE

When the editor states that the district attorney's office received from the prohibition fund approximately \$23,000 for law enforcement, he was approximately correct, and at this point we wish to remind the voters of Jackson County that this is the only item of expense connected with the district attorney's office at issue in this campaign...
