Detailed plans of "Home Products Week" which is to be held in Medford from November 13 to 24, were discussed at a joint meeting of the Medford Chamber of Commerce Retail Trade committee and Merchants' Association at the Hotel Medford last evening.

POSTAL RECEIPTS FOR LAST MONTH SHOW INCREASE

Notwithstanding the drastic reductions in postal rates this year, which caused several Oregon cities to report reduced postal receipts, receipts last month from those of October in 1927, the Medford post-office enjoyed a big increase with \$7172.43 as against October, 1927, of \$6475.97.

The cities which showed a decrease in their receipts last month did more business that month than in October of a year ago, but showed less revenue because of the postal reductions, but not Medford.

CARRYING POWER OF STATION KMED MUCH INCREASED

The new wavelength which will go into effect over KMED, the Mail Tribune-Virgin station, will reach all the Pacific coast states and up into the mountains, according to local station heads, who have been trying out its carrying power at intervals during the week.

All radio stations throughout the country will receive their new wavelengths on Armistice day, so that there will be no interference in reception.

NICARAGUA PRESS PRAISES AMERICAN ELECTION CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(P)—Secretary Kellogg was advised today by Brigadier General Frank I. McCoy, president of the American electoral mission in Nicaragua, that the two chief papers one representing the conservatives and the other representing the liberals had printed articles praising the United States government's supervision of the general elections in that country.

The dispatch, sent last night, showed that the liberal candidate, Jose Maria Moncada, was leading the conservative candidate, Adolfo Benard, by 18,273 votes in 362 of the 442 precincts. The vote stood, liberals 47,989, conservatives 49,667.

The American supervision has honorably observed its promise. The elections Sunday were honest, tranquil, correct and honorable.

PROPERTY OWNERS ASK IMPROVEMENT OF CITY STREETS

At the meeting of the city council committee on streets and roads last night to discuss improvements with interested property owners, residents asked for improvements on streets in various parts of the city, which the city is now able to inaugurate because of nearly \$7000 that has just come to the city treasury from the county road tax fund.

The group of citizens appearing on behalf of this section consisted of Superintendent of Schools E. H. Hedrick, Rawles Moore, J. O. Grey and Charles Wing. They not only asked that the street be graded and graveled, and for permanent sidewalks, at the expense of the property owners, but pointed out the necessity of the city building curbside sidewalks for temporary use during the winter to enable the many children to avoid walking thru mud and water.

The members of the council street and road committee advised that the property owners of Summit street present a petition at the next council meeting, Wednesday night, for the grading and graveled of this section, and said they would recommend to the council that the sidewalks asked for be constructed.

L. J. Adams and Eli Campbell requested needed improvements for the Third and Holly streets section, and the committee decided to recommend to the council the placing of a drain at the intersection of those streets as asked for. R. E. Newland requested that the city build sidewalks on East Ninth street, but the committee decided to take no action until a payment plan was worked out by the property owners, which would be satisfactory to the city government.
