

### BUSINESS PLACES TO CLOSE MONDAY ON ARMISTICE DAY

Medford establishments will be closed all day next Monday in celebration of Armistice day, which falls on Sunday, will be observed on the next day. The decision was reached at a meeting of Medford merchants last night and was reported by Ted Baker at the special meeting last night of the local American Legion post, at which plans for the celebration were also discussed.

Earl Davis, chairman of the parade committee, urged Legionnaires to take part 100 per cent in the parade, which this year will be purely of a civic nature, no commercial floats being entered. The parade will form between 11 a. m. and 12 noon on Main street, and will follow the usual route down Main to Riverside, immediately after Armistice hour.

Plans are complete for the venison feed to be held at the Elks temple for all ex-service men, including G. A. R. members, Spanish-American war veterans and World war veterans as guests. The feed is in charge of Ed Webber, who reported last night that it promises to be one of the best ever. No charge whatever will be made, according to vote of the Legion men last night.

A committee, composed of all past commanders and Mr. Jones of the Music Box radio shop, was appointed to work out ways and means for financing the legion drum corps. A financing plan was suggested and will be thoroughly investigated to ascertain its feasibility. Past Commander Seely V. Hall is chairman of the group.

A resolution was passed at the meeting, urging every voter, especially Legionnaires, to vote early, and was passed in conjunction with a nationwide plan of the Legion to encourage early voting.

### W. C. T. U. to Renew Vigor of Temperance Education Campaign

EVANSTON, Ill. (AP)—A revitalization of its teaching of temperance—a function delegated by its founder, Frances Willard—is to be given the Woman's Christian Temperance Union at its annual convention in Boston, November 14 to 22.

National officers of the organization think the W. C. T. U. should undertake a campaign of temperance and prohibition educational work on a greater scale than ever before. Among the specific education subjects to be offered the members are the Canadian plan of government control and the Bratt system of liquor dispensing now in force in Sweden.

More than 3,000 delegates, alternates, state officers, national officers and directors of educational departments, representing a membership of nearly 1,000,000 women, will attend the Boston convention—the fifty-fourth since Miss Willard organized the body.
