

# EGGS FLUCTUATE PORTLAND TODAY; APPLES GO GOOD

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Top grades of eggs were somewhat easier on local wholesale markets today, while peewees were 2c higher, reflecting similar movements in quotations late yesterday. Standard extras and firsts were both a cent lower at 42c and 41c respectively, while undersized were up to 36c. Other grades were unchanged.

The only change in the butter list was a reduction of 1/2c on the standard to 48 1/2c per pound. Conditions on the meat and poultry markets were practically unchanged. Veal and hogs continued easy and straggy, but values were not notably lower. Fancy turkeys moved out about as quickly as received, fetching 28c @ 46c per pound, dressed. Birds for live turkeys were mostly around 25c, a few in top condition bringing a few cents more.

Due perhaps to election day activity, there was little trading in wholesale fruit and vegetable markets. Sales of apples during the past week were considerably greater than previously, advertising and displays having aroused consumer demand perceptibly. Prices today, the last day of national apple week, were unchanged from previous quotations.

Still less did Eva Von Berne little Eva Von Pleznzer dream that the commotion in her home town that day would eventually change the whole course of her life and put her into those American movies she liked so much. As a matter of fact, she had no idea what the commotion was about. Her father, a wealthy Austrian, believed firmly that all disturbing news, such as reports of assassinations or other fatalities should be kept from the ears of children.

War Leads to Career  
Even after war was declared, and all through the long war years, he followed this policy of barring all turmoil and excitement of the outside world from his home. So Eva scarcely knew a war was going on, and even now recalls the war years as the happiest of her childhood.

When peace came, however, all that was changed. Her father's fortune crashed with the collapse of Austria. Wanting to escape poverty, Eva was growing up, and the time came when she had to think of earning a living. The family was living in Vienna then, and it occurred to Eva that success as a dancer might win back for her some of the things she had lost. She entered a school for dances and made such progress that when a newspaper published an account of the school's latest presentation her picture appeared as that of the most promising pupil.

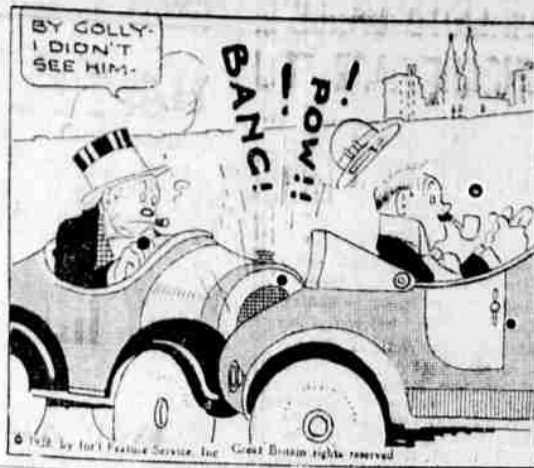
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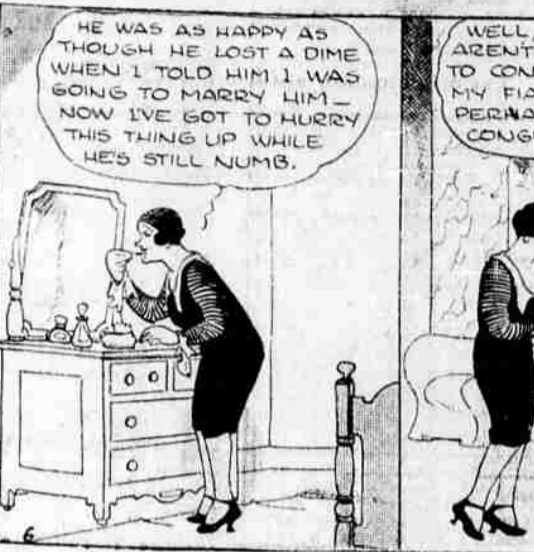
