

KING DISCUSSES KELLOGG-BRIAND PACT IN ADDRESS

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 6.—(AP)—The Kellogg-Briand pact renouncing war took precedence today in the address which King George read from the throne in opening parliament.

The speech was heard by a brilliantly robed assemblage of peers and their bejeweled peeresses with commoners looking on and listening from their balconies.

"My relations with foreign powers continue to be friendly," the king began in deep, clear tones, reading from a scroll. "My government has been happy to accept the treaty of renunciation of war in the world proposed by the government of the United States.

VETERAN LEAVES INSURANCE MONEY TO LEGION POSTS

SPokane, Wash., Nov. 6.—(AP)—Because the Spokane Post No. 9, American Legion had befriended him when he was ill, Jack Lupton, Philippine and World War veteran, willed the post \$5400, G. I. Toews, executor of the estate, has announced.

A portion of the money, the will ordered, was to be sent to the Walla Walla, Wash., post of the Legion, of which Lupton was a member, while fatally ill with tuberculosis in the veterans' hospital in that city. The balance was to be used by the Spokane post for charity. The money given to the Walla Walla post was to be used for the care of veterans' graves.

Through efforts of the Spokane Legion Lupton's insurance policy, which had been assigned to himself, was reinstated, and when it was found that the former service man was suffering from tuberculosis, he was sent to the veterans' hospital.

EARTH TREMORS FELT ABOUT TIFLIS

MOSCOW, Nov. 6.—(AP) A pronounced earthquake was felt at Tiflis, Georgia, and the surrounding district today. The epicenter was estimated to be about 60 miles from Tiflis.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Severe earthquake shocks, lasting for more than three hours, indicating a marked disturbance on the earth surface at a distance of 7000 miles, were recorded about last midnight by the seismograph at Georgetown university.

Prof. Torndorf, observer at the school, said that the record of the earthquake was one of the heaviest observed in recent years. The first signs of the earthquake came to the seismograph needles at 11:20 p. m. Monday, and the vibrations grew steadily to a maximum at 12:05 a. m. Tuesday. For 2 1/2 hours after the first registration, the shocks continued.

Prof. Torndorf said that it was impossible to give any directional estimates as to the earthquake center.

Herbert Moreau, a steel worker, returned home last night to find his four sons lying dead on a bed. The body of their nurse, Miss Violette Hultberg, lay beside them.

OREGON CONVICT, JEFF BALDWIN, IS IN PHILADELPHIA FOR FRIDAY CARD

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 6.—(AP) Jeff Baldwin, declared by state prison authorities to be one of the "hardest" characters ever held in the Oregon penitentiary, who made his escape over the prison wall 10 years ago, is held in Philadelphia as a murder suspect. A circular with Baldwin's picture and finger prints compared with records at the penitentiary definitely established his identity.

Baldwin's regular line is burglary and theft. But once in this state only the failure of a revolver shell to explode kept him from murder, and while in the penitentiary he set a fire in the flax department that caused a \$15,000 damage.

Warden Murphy made him a trusty and he escaped. A few days later he got into trouble at Tangent, Linn county. A deputy sheriff from Albany went to arrest him. Baldwin attempted to shoot the officer, but the gun failed to go off. While being tried at Albany he was identified as the penitentiary escape. The Linn county trial resulted in a 14-year sentence on top of the seven he was already serving.

In 1916 the prison suffered a disastrous flax fire, and an investigation showed that Baldwin had set it alight.

In July 1918, Baldwin attired himself in the garb of a trusty waiter. He spread some window bars and walked over the wall at one of the guard towers where no guard was stationed. A posse took a shot at Baldwin near Salem, but he made good his escape.

SICILIANS DEPART FROM HOMES AS VOLCANO ERUPTS

CATANIA, Sicily, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Evacuation of the town of Mascali before streams of flaming lava, rolling down from the crater of Mount Etna was going on rapidly today.

The railway around Etna has been damaged and service interrupted. A hastily organized motor car service was employed to speed the evacuation of Mascali, while squads of firemen and municipal police hurried from Catania.

Officials on duty in the zone and Lieut.-General Calogno commanding the military zone of Messina, were on the scene, ready to cope with any emergency.

MITT MEN ARRIVE IN CITY TOMORROW FOR FRIDAY CARD

NEW YORK SPORT CARRIES ASSASSIN SECRET TO GRAVE

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(AP)—Arnold Rothstein, big time gambler, who had been a prominent figure in the city's night life for many years and whose activities the authorities have investigated on several occasions, died today, refusing in accordance with the code of the underworld, to reveal the identity of his slayer.

Rothstein, who was a witness at the trial of Police Lieutenant Charles Becker for the murder of Herman Rosenthal, who was once charged with having "fixed" the 1919 world series, and who was indicted in connection with the Fuller-McGee brokerage bankruptcy case, was shot Sunday night in a hotel room, to which he was lured by a telephone call.

Rothstein was a colorful figure in Broadway's gambling life. Wherever there was an element of chance or speculation he was a name to conjure with—on the race track, in a gambling house, a stock deal, a real estate development or a sporting event.

Of late, by his own avowal, he had largely given up gambling to devote himself to his real estate business, but Broadway refused to believe that he had left his old pursuits flat and still linked him with gambling.

He came under the spotlight of notoriety in two great scandals. In 1915 he figured in the "throwing" of the world series by a group of Chicago baseball players to the Cincinnati Reds. He was believed to have put up the money accepted by players, ostensibly to allow the Reds to win.

He failed. He then was taken to a hospital. Callahan had several stitches taken over his eye to close a bad wound suffered in the fight, and then was taken into custody under no charge by the police, pending the outcome of Showers' injuries.

SOCIALISTS CAUSE POINCARE CABINET RESIGN IN BODY

PARIS, Nov. 6.—(AP) The Poincare cabinet, which has been in office since July 23, 1926, resigned in a body today after four radical socialist ministers offered their resignations. The radicals who resigned were Albert Sarraut, minister of interior; Edouard Herriot, minister of education; Henri Queuille, minister of agriculture, and Leon Perrier, minister of colonies.

The radicals announced that their party's program made continued collaboration with the national union cabinet impossible.

Premier Poincare presented the government's resignation to President Doumergue shortly after noon. The cabinet, with the exception of the four radical ministers who absented themselves, devoted three hours to discussing the crisis. The view of the premier that the whole cabinet must withdraw instead of reorganizing to appear before parliament which convenes this afternoon was finally accepted.

The cabinet crisis resulted from action of the radical congress held at Angers. At this conference the party made demands for changes in the governmental program, especially in regard to the budget, which Premier Poincare refused.

The general opinion today was that Premier Poincare would be able to form a cabinet without them that would command a sufficient majority in the chamber of deputies to continue the program of the union government.
