

### MEDFORD QUIET AFTER ELECTION BETS ARE PAID

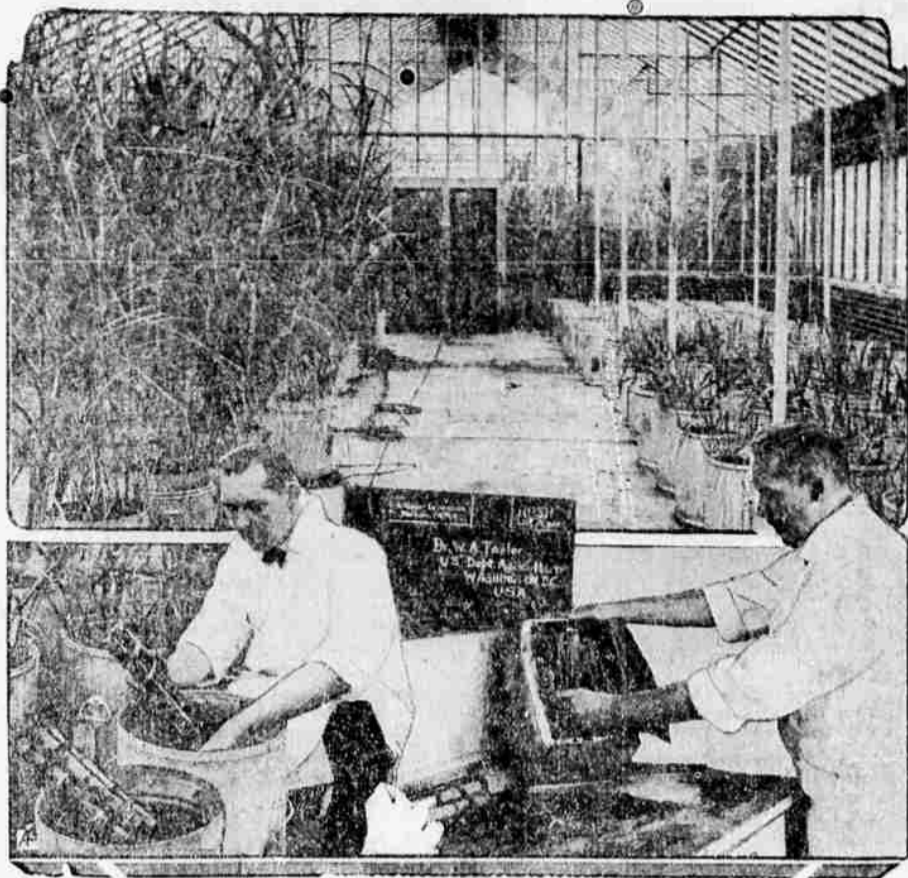
It was a typical post-election Medford that greeted local business and professional men this morning. Department stores, shops and offices were noticeably slumped by local voters, who hugged the street corners, and met in groups to gossip over the results of the national and local elections.

Frequent jubilant outbursts came from the preponderance of Hoover supporters who lined the streets, and considerable bantering followed the settlement of campaign bets which were, on the whole, handed over with typical good sportsmanship during the early hours this morning.

The 500 or more "raddios" taken into the homes of local residents during the week, developed a startling number of radio complexes following the election results, and are being returned to the merchants from which they were "purchased."

The Mail Tribune business office and editorial department as usual fell in for its steady stream of queries on late reports, and became as in the case of all exciting news events, the most popular center in the city.

### U. S. STARTS PROPAGATION OF CANE TAKEN FROM WILDS OF NEW GUINEA



To revive the sugar cane industry in this country the government is making experiments with varieties obtained from the interior of New Guinea, supposedly resistant or immune to mosaic, a disease that now limits production. Above is the guaranteed greenhouse in which the tests are being made, showing at the right thrifty young plants from the New Guinea collection. At the left, below, Dr. E. W. Bramble, who headed the federal expedition, is planting another variety beside those already sprouting.  WASHINGTON (AP)—In a quarantined greenhouse, so carefully guarded from plant diseases that he who enters must sterilize the soles of his shoes, the federal government is making an international celebrated experiment with sugarcane.

If results are all that is hoped for, the declining sugar cane industry in this country will be revived within the next decade by a harder and more prolific plant

than any hitherto known. It will be immune, or highly resistant to mosaic disease now responsible for serious losses to the Louisiana crop and to a number of others considered a potential menace.

Cane for the experiment, a total of 221 varieties belonging to at least 20 species, was brought from the wilds of New Guinea by Dr. E. W. Bramble, head of the U. S. expedition that for eight months cut its way through an unexplored territory larger than the state of Texas. Some of the finest speci-

mens, taken from cane 20 feet tall were cut 2,000 miles up the Fly river, where the jungle-bred pygmies and head-hunters, frenzied at their first sight of white men and a seaplane, kept the explorers constantly in danger.

There, in the original home of sugar cane, Dr. Bramble found evidence of mosaic, but most of the cane appeared to be unaffected. He made cuttings from the healthiest cane, waxed the ends, and shipped them to the United States in airtight cans of charcoal.

### ROBINSON WIRES REPUBLICAN FOES CONGRATULATION

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Nov. 7.—Senator Joe T. Robinson today wired congratulations to Herbert Hoover and Charles Curtis. To Mr. Curtis, his Republican opponent for the vice-presidency, he said:

"Accept my cordial greetings and congratulations."

To Mr. Hoover he wired: "Your victory is decisive. Please receive my congratulations and best wishes."

Both were signed "Joe T. Robinson."

Mr. Robinson, who slept late after listening to returns over the radio until late last night, said he planned to leave in a day or two to spend several days resting at an unannounced place.

### PRESS PRAISES YOUNG GERMAN

Music lovers are exhibiting unusual interest in the coming organ recital of Fernando Germani, the 21-year-old Italian organist, in this city on November 17 at the Presbyterian church. Although only 21 years of age, Germani has been official organist of the famous Augusteo orchestra at Rome since he was 14, and for some time has been recognized in his native land as the foremost organ virtuoso of Italy.

This opinion was confirmed in no uncertain manner upon the occasion of Germani's American debut in the New York Wanamaker auditorium in 1928, when the metropolitan music critics indulged in superlatives in describing his unerring memory, his colossal technique and the lofty beauty of his interpretation. According to the New York Herald-Tribune: "Germani is extremely young and talented, but under his spirited fingers the organ sometimes assumes an approximation of the power and volume of a symphony orchestra," while the New York Telegraph reported: "Germani proved to be a musician of rare talents and a master of his instrument—a brilliant future seems to be in wait for him." The New York American reported: "Germani proved to be an extraordinarily capable performer." The New York Times said: "Germani closed the recital amid an ovation of 15 recalls requested."

### WISCONSIN BACK REPUBLICAN FOLD

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 7.—(AP)—Swinging back into the Republican column after its revolt four years ago Wisconsin yesterday gave Herbert Hoover a majority expected to exceed 100,000. Upon this tide of Republican votes, it appeared that all the party candidates, with the exception of one candidate for congress, had been swept into office.

The state, which in 1924 was alone in its support of Senator Robert M. LaFollette, elected Walter J. Kohler, millionaire manufacturer, and supporter of Hoover, governor over Mayor Albert G. Schmiedeman, Democratic candidate.

Young Robert M. LaFollette was returned for the full six-year term. LaFollette's majority was expected to exceed 400,000.

Four Progressives, Henry A. Huber, lieutenant governor; John W. Reynolds, attorney general; Theo. Dammann, secretary of state, and Solomon Levitan, state treasurer, were elected.

Election of eleven Republicans as Wisconsin's representatives in congress was indicated by early returns in which all rolled up heavy majorities.

### WILDCAT CARTER GARNERS DECISION

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 7.—(AP)—Leslie (Wildcat) Carter, Seattle featherweight boxer, won an easy 10-round decision over Charlie Lupica of Toledo, Ohio, here last night. Carter won every round.

Al Korze, San Diego light heavyweight, pounded out a six-round decision over Nails Gorman of Portland.

Fidel Sanchez, Portland bantam, scored a decision over Ray Woods, Seattle, in six rounds. Sig Bennett and Ray Giff, Portland welterweights, went four rounds to a draw and Chuck Rosander, Portland, won a four-round decision over Benny Lancy, Portland lightweight.

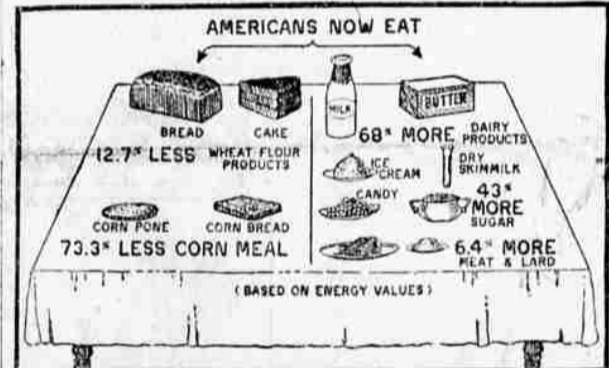

### DIET HAS CHANGED IN UNITED STATES DURING 25 YEARS

America's eating habits are changing. From a corn pone eating nation, we have turned into a nation of milk eaters.

A recent study of American diet of the present day and that of 25 years ago shows that we are eating 73.3 per cent less of corn pone—our national staple for 100 years—than we did then. We are also eating less of all bread, cake and the like, as shown in the fact that the consumption of wheat flour products today is 12.7 per cent under what it was back in the '90's.

In contrast to this, we are now using 68 per cent more dairy products than we did in the days "way back when." We eat more butter, drink more milk and consume enormous quantities of ice cream every day. We pamper our sweet tooth to the tune of a 43 per cent gain in the consumption of sugar in the same 25 years. We are also helping ourselves to bigger meat and lard portions by 6.4 per cent than did our parents.

A factor which undoubtedly explains a good bit of the tremendous popularity of dairy products in our own times is that we now take a lot of our milk in other ways than by drinking. ### SOUTH DAKOTA VOTE SWELLING MAJORITY

Herbert Hoover's claim to South Dakota's five electoral votes swelled to a 36,000 majority as the unofficial count grew to within 75,000 votes of the estimated balloting by the state's electorate Tuesday.

The state's three incumbent Republican congressmen held substantial leads over Democratic opponents, as did all Republican state office candidates with the exception of their candidate for governor. The Democratic incumbent, W. J. Bulow, held a lead of nearly 20,000 majority over Attorney-General Duell F. Jones.

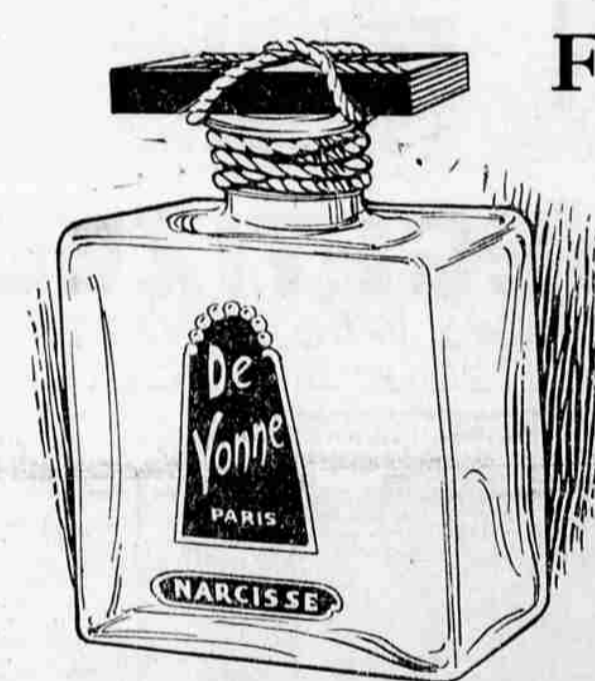

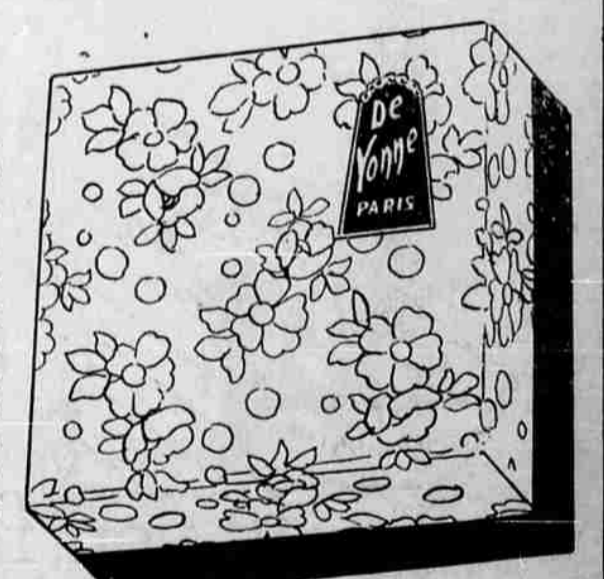
