HOLIDAY TURKEYS MAY COME HIGH THIS YEAR



The annual "turkey trot" of Texas birds to holiday tables will soon begin, but the parade is likely to be less impressive than usual because of diminished numbers, and growers forecast high prices as a result. DALLAS, Texas (AP)—The "turkey trot," that march of birds which starts on Texas farms and ends on Thanksgiving and Christmas day tables, soon will be under way in half a dozen counties as the holiday season draws near.

The procession to dressing and pre-cooling plants, where fowls are killed preparatory to shipment east and north, will not be a thunderous parade of heavily-bodied birds. It will resemble, rather, a delicate patterling for ranks of the soldiers have been thinned at least 30 per cent this year, and average weights will be lower than in previous seasons.

Because of feed shortages and

disease in all parts of the turkey-raising area, delegates attending the recent convention of the Texas Butter, Egg and Poultry association at Fort Worth were outspoken in their opinion that an ample supply would not be available for the Thanksgiving demand.

Probably the highest prices known on the market in years have been forecast. It is believed by growers that their birds will be sold at from 30 to 40 cents a pound or an average of \$5 each for the 175,000 Texas turkeys soon to be roasting in ovens over the land.

Brady, Texas, center of the industry, is abuzzing with preparation for the final round-up of all turkeys raised within a 75-mile radius. Herded together each

year through the streets of the little town to the accompaniment of blaring bands and the click of motion picture cameras.

Brady, like other towns in the turkey-growing district, has three plants where the birds are slaughtered and placed in cooling vaults. More than 120,000 pounds of meat are handled daily.

"Roughers," the term applied to men engaged in the work, require less than a minute to kill the birds and strip off feathers. Many expert dressers earn as much as \$10 and \$50 daily working on the commission basis of five cents a bird, handling between 800 and 1,000 in a 12-hour period. The following work is done by pickers in less than 10 minutes.
