

CAMPFIRE GIRLS OF ASHLAND PLAN BAZAAR DEC. 8TH

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 9.—

(Special.)—The Campfire Girls of Ashland, who are very active in their several organizations, are working hard to have a bazaar on December 8th. This is an annual affair, which the girls want to make bigger and better than ever in 1928. The profits from the enterprise are used either to further their own work in general or for charitable purposes.

The Girls' League, consisting of girls from the various departments and classes of the high school, was recently organized to promote good fellowship and various times of development among the high school girls. Among other things the members are available by mothers, who wish to leave their children in the care of a responsible person, while out for the evening. Meetings are held on Thursdays and girls from 12 to 19 years of age are eligible for membership.

The city council and budget committee met on Monday night and adjourned to meet again on Thursday night for further consideration of the city's budget for the year, 1929. The postponement was due, partly to the fact that the election ballot contained a revenue measure for the benefit of the upkeep of the Ashland cemetery and the result of the election will probably have some bearing upon the conclusions of the committee.

The Ladies' Civic Improvement club has realized about \$180 to date from their recent rummage sales. Mrs. L. A. Roberts was chairman of the committee and was assisted by Mrs. George A. Briscoe and Mrs. B. B. Ball. Mrs. Lillian Greer did effective publicity work for the organization.

The city streets, and particularly the intersections, which were somewhat damaged by the heavy truck hauling materials for the Redder chulch dam in Ashland canyon, now practically completed, are being repaired and put in normal condition for winter use. Two or three weeks will be required in the canyon for cleaning up the debris and other refuse from construction work on the dam, then the reservoir will be ready for the winter season.

Girls of one of the junior high school sewing classes were taken to the shop of the Standard Cleaners on Oak street during the past week by Miss Sue Morris, instructor in home economics, and were given a demonstration in cleaning by S. D. Doremus, proprietor of the shop.

Severe injuries to his right arm, the general shock and possible internal injuries are given as causes of death. 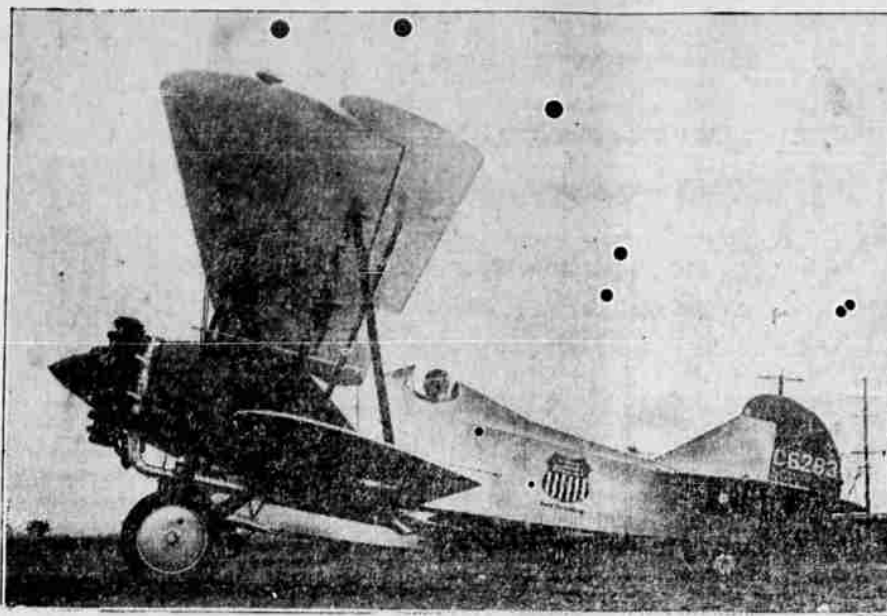

UNION OFFICIAL VISITS MEDFORD

With the two-fold purpose of obtaining the latest data on commercial and private airplane traffic in northern California, Oregon and Washington and to inspect the airplane servicing facilities of the airports, C. F. Lienesch, head of the technical relations department of the Union Oil company, on a 4000-mile flight in these states in a Travel Air J-4 plane, one of the four maintained by the company to keep abreast of aviation development in the west, arrived in Medford Thursday noon, transacted

business with the local representative of the company, A. J. Dean. Mr. Lienesch left Thursday afternoon for Roseburg but, owing to rain and fog up state, returned to the Medford port, stayed here all night and left this morning for Roseburg.

He will arrive in Portland today and will leave there Monday for a trip over eastern Oregon and Washington. He will leave Portland on the return trip Sunday.

As a direct result of his trip, Mr. Lienesch hopes to eliminate many of the delays now encountered in fueling and oiling planes by installing equipment at airports where traffic will warrant it that will insure greater servicing efficiency and speed. The company is installing an airport service airplane that will be in operation Wednesday of next week.

Mr. Lienesch is a war-time army pilot and has a host of friends among fliers up and down the Pacific coast. He was pleased with the idea that Medford is to have a new airport to meet the demands of the coast air traffic.

FILIPINO LEADERS PLEASED HOOVER ELECTION VICTOR

MANILA, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Filipino leaders generally commented favorably today upon the election of Herbert Hoover to the presidency of the United States.

Manuel Quezon, president of the Philippine senate and a leading advocate of independence for the islands, said:

"It is my belief that during the administration of Mr. Hoover the Philippine question will receive very serious consideration, and that a solution consistent with the duties of America and satisfactory to the Filipino people will be found."

Manuel Roxas, speaker of the Philippine house of representatives, said:

"Mr. Hoover's experience during the World war and the period of reconstruction has made him familiar with international affairs. He will deal by us justly."

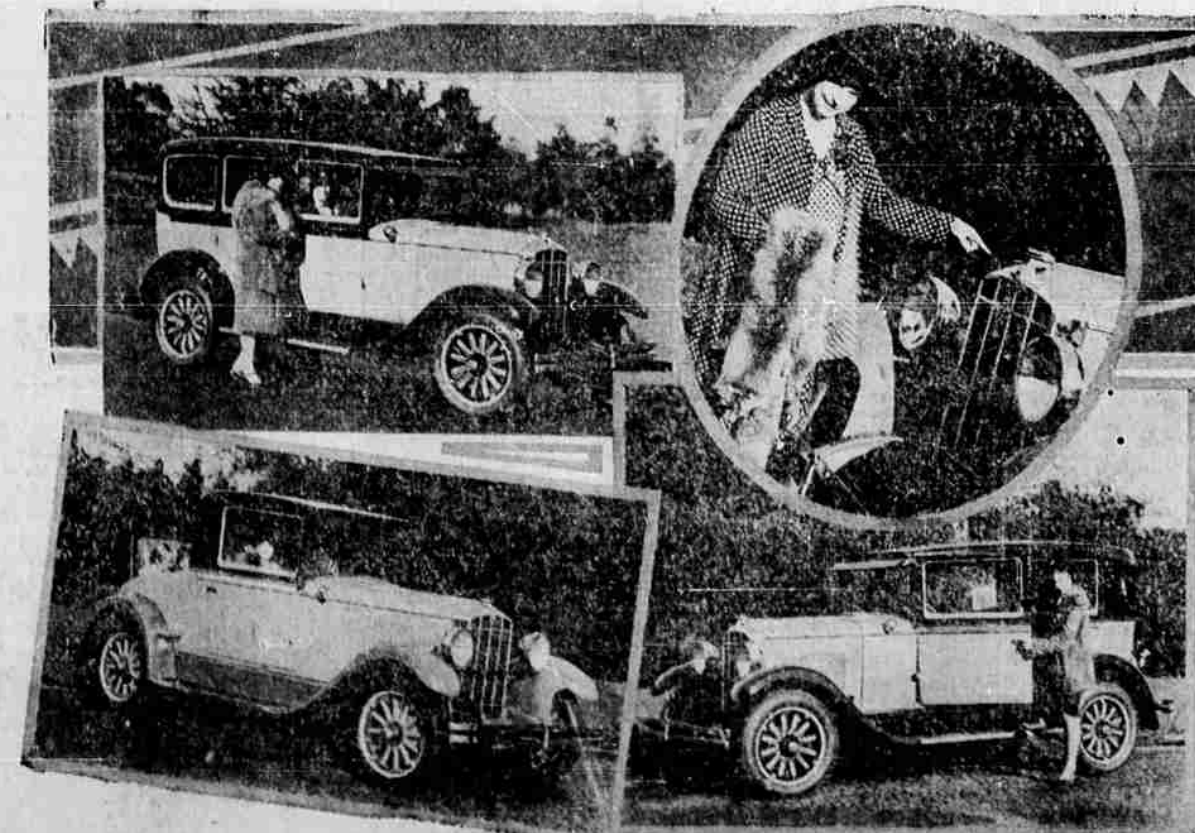

HOOVER MAJORITY IN NO. CAROLINA 50,000

CHARLOTTE, N. C., Nov. 9.—(AP) Herbert Hoover's majority in North Carolina is now expected to be in the neighborhood of 50,000 when official returns of the election are tabulated by the state election board two weeks hence.

Returns unofficially tabulated here, many of them official figures today gave the president-elect a lead of 46,358 with 148 of the state's 1733 precincts missing. The missing precincts were scattered in all sections of the state. The vote was Hoover 310,188; Smith 269,825.
