Judge C. M. Thomas, recently defeated candidate for re-election to the circuit bench of Jackson and Josephine counties, will retire to private practice here January 1, according to his present plans as disclosed to the Mail Tribune this morning.

"We love Medford, and prefer to stay here rather than to move to a larger community," he said. That he will not take up criminal cases, was another statement made by the circuit judge, who said that he felt the prestige accruing from his present office would bring him the better class of practice.

gratulations to Mr. Hoover express the right American feeling. The thing now is for all Americans to get together and show Europe, Asia and Africa what the word prosperity really means.

This country, once the great sugar consuming nation of the world, now eats less sugar than it needs, A GREAT DEAL LESS, as is shown in an investigation ordered by Earl D. Pabst, head of the American Sugar Refining Co. Sugar is necessary to health. Nations insufficiently supplied with sugar, as was shown in the big war, are nations partly starved.

Australia uses per capita 18 pounds more than the United States, and New Zealand used 15 pounds per year more than the United States.

Sugar, considering its value to the body, is by far the cheapest food known to man. And now, especially, under prohibition with many longer getting from alcohol the carbohydrates formerly consumed, the national consumption should be restored to the old ratio.
