

MANY RESIDENTS HERE TO ATTEND IRRIGATION MEET

All persons interested in irrigation, reclamation, drainage, or any of these phases, will be welcome and are earnestly requested to attend the Oregon Reclamation Congress annual session, which will be held at Salem on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, Nov. 14, 15 and 16, one of which Glen Arnsperger of Medford, is the president.

In addition to Mr. Arnsperger, quite a number of others from the Rogue River valley and southern Oregon will attend, including F. C. Diland, R. P. Cowgill, Ed. Leach and Ted Semon.

The first day will be devoted to the Drainage Section of the Congress, leaving the second and third days for the Irrigation Section. This arrangement will give ample opportunity for all irrigation district officials to get to Salem in time for the irrigation section of the attending to their respective district elections.

The report of the legislative committee which is dated for the afternoon of November 15 will be put over until November 16 in order that the legislative committee can have time to meet with all persons interested in legislative matters before making its recommendations.

Changes in clarification of laws on the following subjects have been proposed:

- 1. Clarification of the election laws as to "bona-fide owner," qualification of elector, joint deed votes, man and wife both voting, and name on last year's assessment roll.
2. A change in the law so that penalty and interest taxes shall accrue to the district instead of the County.
3. A simplification of the procedure for the foreclosing of delinquent district taxes.
4. Changing the time of seating newly elected directors from February to January.
5. A ruling as to district assessments being taxed or not.
6. A specific wording of the law stating County and State lands to be liable to assessment.
7. A change in the law so that at the end of one year, at the instance of the district, the County shall foreclose.
8. A law so that it should not be necessary to bring suit to quiet title after foreclosure.
9. A law to enable a district to assess fractional areas as though they were full acres to eliminate any parties less than one acre on the assessment roll.
10. A law cancelling interest guarantees.
