LARGE PARADE IN OBSERVANCE OF ARMISTICE DAY

Thirty Organizations Participate in March—Cowgill Marshal of Day—Elks Band Plays for Veterans Three Wars.

With approximately 2000 men, women and children participating, representing 36 different organizations, activities and schools, the Armistice Day parade, which passed in formation thru the streets of Medford this morning, was said to be the largest and most impressive of its kind ever held here.

Veterans of three wars, and their auxiliary forces, marched the length of Main street, from Washington school to Riverside before the large number of spectators, not a few of whom were moved to tears by the flood of memories these groups evoked.

Ralph P. Cowgill, who acted as marshal of the day, led the parade on horseback. He was followed by the Elks band in uniform, which played the stirring strains of war time marches.

Company A of the local National Guard came next. Then came three veterans of the Civil war, who marched, and six others who rode in cars. They were accompanied by the Woman's Relief Corps. The D. A. R. came after these, and then about 30 veterans of the Spanish American war, and their auxiliary organization.

A large number of Redmen and members of the Pocomontis lodge followed in uniform and added color to the line-up.

The Dukes in their brilliant costumes came next and then the Red Cross float, which carried a tableau of the Mississippi flood relief. The Ministerial association followed in cars.

The Elks, the Knights of Pythias and the Pythian Sisters, and the Boy Scouts, were among the fraternal organizations which participated in the parade. The Oregon-Washington Pythian Home float, carried a model of this charitable institution, and a group of children, introducing the occupants, sitting in miniature chairs in the back yard.

The boys' Junior drum corps made a splendid showing in uniform and played some snappy tunes that elicited applause from the crowds along the streets. They were followed by the various student bodies from the schools of Medford, each wearing different costume effects and carrying banners.

Among these groups were the high school, St. Mary's Academy, Washington school, Jackson school, Lincoln school, Roosevelt school. The high school band appeared in striking red and black uniforms, and were led in some splendid marching selections by Wilson Wait.

About 300 American Legion men held up the rear of the parade, led by the drum corps in their blue and red uniforms, and kept in line by Earl Davis, chairman of the parade committee.

There was a number of colorful elements in the parade, including the long, highly decorated, 40 ft train, and "The Spirit of Yreka," a bucking motor bus, used by the same organization.

The formal observance of the day after the parade included the venison feed for all ex-service men, held under the auspices of the American Legion post, at the Elks' club house this noon, the annual Medford high-ashland high football game this afternoon, and the Armistice day ball at the Oriental Gardens.

Radio Man's Name Again Heard in Investigation—May Be Called to Testify Tomorrow—Other Angelus Officers Mentioned.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 12.—(AP)—As in the days when the missing radio man was accused of having been Almee Sempie McPherson's companion in a cottage at Carmel-by-the-Sea, the name of Kenneth G. Ormiston today again loomed large in the investigation of the manner in which the conspiracy charges against the evangelist came to be dropped.

Attaches of the county grand jury said last night that the one-time Angelus temple radio man probably would be called tomorrow as a witness in the resumption of the inquiry. Several former officers of the huge religious organization as well as some of the present executives, may be called in the grand jury's investigation of transactions in the defense of the McPherson case, said to have totaled more than \$800,000. Documents indicating expenditures of that amount were made available to the grand jury by newspapermen to whom they had been given by the evangelist's mother, Mrs. Annie Kennedy, formerly business manager of the temple, and co-defendant with her daughter in the conspiracy case.

In the days when the cases of Mrs. McPherson and her mother were going through a sensational preliminary hearing in municipal court, Ormiston said to have been with Mrs. McPherson at a time when she claimed to have been held by kidnapers, was missing. The two women were held for trial on the charges, but later they were dismissed for lack of evidence by District Attorney Asa Keyes. The recent indictment of the prosecutor and seven others on bribery charges in connection with alleged "fixing" of charges in the Julian Preobahn corporation affair started the grand jury on its investigation of the famous McPherson case.

Ormiston, who returned to Los Angeles some time after the evangelist's hearing, now is in the radio business here.

In the place of that stirring pursuit of Ormiston that marked the McPherson case of earlier days, officers today hunted a mysterious trunk, believed by the authorities to contain evidence of importance to the present inquiry.

Keyes and attorneys for the other seven indicted yesterday announced that plea of not guilty would be entered tomorrow, when they come up for arraignment.

Oregon Senator Tells President Agrarian Situation Should Be Early Problem for Congress—Senator Reed Optimistic on Relief

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—(AP)—After conferring with President Coolidge today on farm legislation and Muscle Shoals, Senator McNary of Oregon said that he thought it was "the duty" of congress to deal with the agrarian situation at the earliest possible time. Both the president and the president-elect, McNary said, were agreed that the farm question required immediate attention, and he, therefore, would exert himself to the utmost to have farm legislation approved by the short session of congress without awaiting the special session which Herbert Hoover said he would call, if necessary, immediately after inauguration.

Senator McNary said that his chief duty at present concerning Muscle Shoals, was to determine the exact status of the bill which was approved in the closing days of the last session and to which the chief executive failed to sign.

Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, who also called at the White House, said he believed it should be possible to enact farm legislation at the forthcoming session of congress.

Reed declared the equalization fee principle was out of consideration. He added that he had urged President Coolidge to increase the tariff on plate glass the full fifty per cent allowed under the flexible provisions of the tariff act.
