

CARL B. ROSTEL FUNERAL SERVICE IN CENTRAL POINT

A long line of nearly 100 curd-bearing friends of Carl B. Rostel, pioneer business man of Jackson county, formed the sad procession which accompanied his remains from the Rostel home at Central Point to their final resting place in the Masonic cemetery in Jacksonville yesterday.

The funeral services were read in the home of the deceased by Dr. Hiltner, bishop of the Lutheran church, who delivered a brief and splendid sermon.

The room in which the casket rested was banked with floral tributes from friends and organizations, more than 50 large pieces being brought in throughout the forenoon.

Honorary pallbearers were: W. L. Leaven, L. E. Hatfield, L. D. Lewis, Wm. Bahmert, C. E. Lange and A. C. Murray.

Active pallbearers were chosen from among the membership of the Masonic lodge, who conducted the ceremony at the grave. Emil Britt of Jacksonville gave the final address.

CHILDREN PERISH IN RUSSIAN MOVIE BLAZE STAMPEDE

VORONEZH, Russia, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Many children today were believed to have perished in a fire which destroyed a motion picture theater at Rhozhysta Saturday night.

Wholly unconfirmed reports reaching here place the number of dead at 29. Crews of rescue workers were still working today to extricate charred bodies from the debris and a check-up of the deaths will be made as soon as this work is completed.

The fire started in the operating room and spread rapidly. In the stampede for the exits men and women clogged the doorways, leaving many children behind to perish. Firemen arrived too late to halt the panic or control the flames.

The film operator and his assistant escaped by jumping through a window.

WAR ACE AVIATOR HAUNTED MEMORY CRASHES IN RACE BRINGS MURDERER POCATELLO, IDAHO TO A CONFESSION

POCATELLO, Idaho, Nov. 12.—(AP)—Harry McDougall, 23, of Boise, assistant attorney general and world war ace, and Miss Edda Hines, 29, his sister-in-law, were killed Sunday when the motor-coupe airplane, piloted by McDougall, crashed about two miles west of the Pocatello airport.

The accident occurred during a race in the air circus celebration of Armistice day held under the auspices of the American Legion.

The small plane, according to eye witnesses, was making a turn toward the field over the flying course, when at an altitude of about 150 feet, it went into a tail spin and then nose-dived to the ground.

At the time of the crash, McDougall was flying directly below the ship piloted by William Gowen of Boise, who was racing a small low monoplane. When Gowen saw the McDougall plane crash he immediately swung his ship around and landed near the wrecked plane.

McDougall, a captain in the aviation reserve corps, was credited with bringing down more than five enemy planes during the world war, and was decorated with the distinguished service cross and the croix de guerre.

He is survived by his widow and two children.

JACKSON COUNTY Led State Vote in Favor Hoover

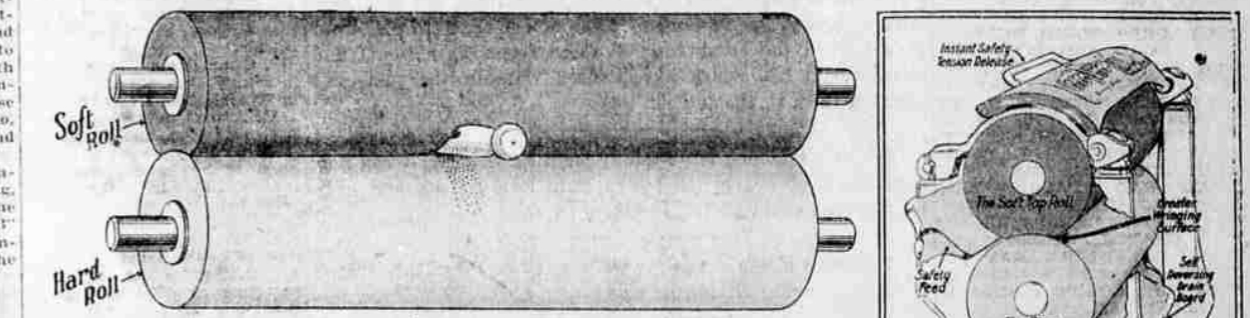
Jackson county was one of three counties in the state during the recent election to cast a vote for Herbert Hoover in excess of its Republican registration. The vote was 300 greater, the vote in Crook county was 175 greater and the vote in Lake county 89 greater.

The analysis also shows Hoover exceeded the Coolidge vote of four years ago in the state by the tremendous total of 59,180 votes. On the other hand, Smith exceeded the vote given Davis by 38,700 in the proportion of votes given Hoover in the election Jackson county led the entire state.
