MEDFORD BEAT ASHLAND TEAM ARMISTICE DAY

Annual Contest Ends in 25 to 7 Victory for Local High—First Squad Takes Game Easy—Second String Goes In.

Medford defeated the Ashland high school football team yesterday afternoon, 25 to 7, in a hotly contested game, before a large Armistice day crowd. The first squad played under wraps. Ashland depended entirely upon an aerial attack, but it was consistently smothered until McCloud scored their only touchdown late in the third quarter on a long forward pass. Ashland completed only five out of 27 forward passes.

The Medford regulars played the first half, and scored 19 points their first touchdown coming in the first three minutes of play. The locals kept the ball in enemy territory, but suffered heavily on penalties for roughness and stalling, as did the Lithians.

Coach Callison swung his second squad into action in the second half, and they put up a heroic battle, scoring one touchdown, and losing another on the one-yard line, when Garnett fumbled. Potter, Applegate and Garnett in the backfield, and Green and Thomas on the line, did the best work for the scrubs. Potter scored the touchdown for the second team on old-fashioned line smashing.

Bernie Hughes kicked off to McCloud, who returned the ball nine yards. Hitchcock was thrown for a loss on the first play, a line buck, and Anderson snared a forward pass. Melvin knocked down a long leave, and Ashland kicked to Melvin, who returned the ball 20 yards. Anderson smashed thru tackle for 10 yards, and first down. Cookiee slipped through center for 12 yards. Melvin got six yards on a quarterback sneak. Harrell ripped through tackle for 19 yards, and a touchdown.

Ashland took the kick-off, and three more forward passes were completed, and Medford was penalized 25 yards for roughness, and lost the ball. Harrell intercepted a forward pass and sped 19 yards before tackled. Cookiee bounced off tackle for 15 yards. Melvin and Anderson hit center for five yards each. A forward pass failed, and Melvin kicked to McCloud, who was downed in his tracks. Ashland suffered a 20-yard penalty for roughness. Cookiee intercepted an Ashland pass. Harrell took 10 yards through tackle. Cookiee hit the same spot for 15 more. Cookiee and Melvin carried the ball on line plunges to the 16-yard line and Harrell, on a crisis-

PACIFIC LEAGUE WILL QUIT SPLIT COMING SEASON

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Directors of the Pacific Coast Baseball league meeting here, last night decided against continuing the split season and voted for a straight 28-week season next year, opening March 26.

Universal draft, under which the big league clubs could draft any minor league player for \$7500 whether the player had big league experience or not, was opposed. The present draft system permits big league clubs to draft only players who have had big league experience.

After further futile ballots last night the directors failed to elect a president and adjourned until 11:30 at Hollywood, when another effort will be made to elect.

LARGEST CROWD EVER EXPECTED TO VIEW OREGON GRID CLASSIC

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 13.—(AP)—The annual football game between the University of Oregon and Oregon State college varsity teams is expected to be played at Corvallis Saturday before the largest crowd ever to see the teams in a battle against each other. Pre-season showing of the teams gives the Aggies the edge in the backfield play with Oregon holding the advantage in the line.

Although Oregon expects to start its entire first string line against the Aggies, two cripples will be in the Webfoot lineup—George Stadelman, center, and George Christenson, 225-pound tackle. Both were injured in the Washington game a month ago and in the contest against the California Bears last week. Christenson was carried off the field in both games with a sprained ankle, while Stadelman has an injured knee.

OKLAHOMA SQUAD SUFFERS INJURIES

NOMAN, Okla., Nov. 13.—(AP)—Battered and bruised so badly in last week's crushing 6 to 44 defeat by Nebraska's powerful gridiron machine, 25 members of the Oklahoma football squad were unable to report for practice last night. Only one member of the first or second string team showed up on the field, causing virtual cancellation of the Monday night's workout.

GRANGE GRANTED CHANGE OF VENUE

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RAY SCHALK SIGNS TO HELP M'GRAW 'MASTER MINDING'

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—(AP)—Ray Schalk, one of the greatest catchers the major leagues have ever seen, has signed to assist John J. McGraw in his "master-minding" next year. Schalk, who resigned as manager of the Chicago White Sox in July of the 1928 campaign.

Schalk affixed his signature to a contract which makes him first assistant to the "Little Napoleon" of the New York Giants. Schalk succeeds Roger Bresnahan, an underdog, asked catcher, who, it is understood, agreed for his release because he had "something better in view." It is expected Bresnahan will become a minor league club manager, although just what he has in view is not disclosed.
