

FIRST TURKEYS TO LEAVE TOMORROW FOR NEW YORK

The first carload of Rogue River valley turkeys for New York markets will be shipped out by express tomorrow by the Poultry Growers' association of the Farm Bureau. The first carload will consist of 2000 birds.

Turkey raisers have responded briskly to the call and a force of workers are kept busy preparing the fowls for shipment. The fowls are packed in barrels for shipment, first being plucked thoroughly for if there is anything a New Yorker hates it is a turkey with patches of feathers remaining.

The majority of the birds are fine corn and grasshopper fed specimens, with clear white hides. There are a few scrawny, tough-looking No. 2 grades. There are a few of large size, but most of the lot are the right size.

NATION'S APPLES EXCEED AVERAGE CROP PRODUCTION

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 14.—(AP) The apple crop of the United States in 1928 has been estimated by the department of agriculture at 34,441,000 barrels, compared with 25,800,000 barrels in 1927 and 35,700,000 for five-year average.

Oregon's 1928 crop is estimated at 1,600,000 barrels, the 1927 crop was 975,000 barrels, and the five-year average was 1,454,200.

Total potato production in the United States was estimated at 45,651,000 bushels, compared with 40,664,000 for 1927, and 39,776,000 five-year average.

MONEY IS ASKED FOR ORPHAN HOME FARM

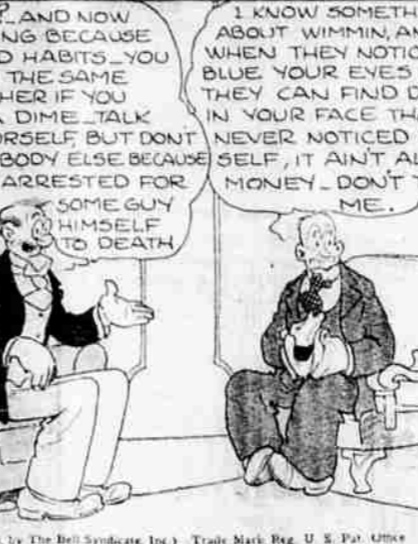

RED CROSS ACTIVE HELPING VETERANS AFTER ARMISTICE

Completing its twentieth year of work for World War veterans since the signing of the Armistice, the American Red Cross has given assistance to an average of 484 ex-service men and their families in Oregon each month during the last year.

Nationally, the report states, Red Cross chapters have helped an average of 49,593 service and ex-service men each month in addition to special services carried on in government hospitals, camps and training stations where the organization assisted an average of 15,965 each month.

Included in the services extended are help in settling government claims for disability, assistance in procuring hospital treatment, and the extension of financial and other aid to the families of veterans while claims are in process of settlement.

Of paramount importance, the report emphasizes, is the assistance given veterans in solving personal problems, which often present almost insurmountable barriers to their readjustment.
