CONTINUE EFFORTS SECURE GRID GAME FOR THANKSGIVING

Negotiations for a football game in this city Thanksgiving Day between the Medford and Everett, Wash., high school teams apparently have gone slightly awry. A letter was received from the Everett school this morning stating they would not consider a game before December 1, and only in their own town. Principal H. B. Conkle immediately wrote the state athletic association for permission to play the game, which sanction is unlikely as they passed a rule forbidding high school football games after that date. After the action of the Everett school, an invitation was extended the Olympia, Wash., high school team; said to be stronger than Everett, and the Commerce high school of Portland was asked if they would consider a game here Thanksgiving, in the event they won the Portland championship. The Medford team plays Eugene high here Saturday, November 17, and the annual Thanksgiving game with Ashland was mutually cancelled last week, so unless a team is secured Medford will be without a game on the biggest football day of the year.

LACK OF LICENSE HAUL PASSENGERS IS ARREST CAUSE

When F. M. Farmer, inspector for the Oregon public service commission and State Traffic Officer O. O. Nichols yesterday placed under arrest George B. Williams of San Francisco on the accusation that he was operating a "wild cat" bus in Oregon without a license from the public service commission, the latter denied the allegation, claiming that he was not operating a bus for hire and that the persons in his seven-passenger Hudson car, with a California motor license, were only friends he was hauling north. Yet the officers say, Williams could not remember the names of those friends, which they say is very peculiar. In Judge Taylor's court here later yesterday Williams entered a plea of not guilty to the technical charge of operating a car for hire in Oregon and California without a public service commission license. He put up cash bail of \$50 and his hearing will be held on November 23.

There were eight inches of snow last night on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway between here and Klamath Falls and it was snowing and raining at the way from Redding, Cal., yesterday on the Pacific highway. It was not known here about the snow condition of the Klamath Falls highway today, but it was presumed that the most of the snow had been cleared or melted away and that the highway was passable. There was no snow in the Skiyous on the Pacific highway this forenoon, but it was cloudy and the going was quite icy in the shady spots, a motorist arriving in the city from California reported this morning. He also said that the stretch of the Pacific highway south of Dunsmuir, where road improvement work is under way for 12 miles, is quite soft, and that chains are needed for cars traveling over it.

ROUND TRIP FARE FOR DALLES GAME BUT NO SPECIAL

The little likelihood of operating the excursion train to The Dalles from Medford November 17, according to A. E. Rossum, local district manager, who explained that in order to provide the \$15 round trip rate, the Southern Pacific would have to be assured of at least 100 passengers from Medford and surrounding points.
