

TURKEYS RECEIVED POLICE ROUNDUP TO NOON MONDAY BY FARM BUREAU

CHICAGO KILLERS

Of interest to Southern Oregon turkey growers is the announcement today by the Farm Bureau Co-operative Exchange, through Clay Parker, manager, that they will be accepted there for shipment to the New York market up until noon Monday instead of noon Saturday, giving valley growers extra time in bringing the birds to the exchange. However, turkey growers are urged to bring in as many as possible on Saturday to facilitate the outward shipments.

The cash price paid on delivery here is equal to the latest turkey quotations from the Portland markets. While the birds are mortal in the valley, they are not arriving as rapidly as they might due to the inability to get the turkeys ready, caused to a great extent by the scarcity of picklers.

ROSEBURG, Ore., Nov. 15.—(P) The Thanksgiving turkey pool of the Douglas County Turkey Growers' association was sold last night to Terje Commission company of Omaha, Nebraska, for shipment to New York by express.

The prices were: Young toms, 28½¢; hens, 28½¢; number 2 grade, 29½¢; old toms 31½¢. The price is one and one-half cent better on young, toms and one-half cent better on hens than the bids received two weeks ago, when all proposals were rejected by the growers.

The purchasers will receive the turkeys at Roseburg, Drain, Yoncalla and Eugene next Monday. It is estimated that there will be from 8,000 to 10,000 birds in the pool.


