ALL OREGON MEN READY FOR FRAY NEXT SATURDAY

EUGENE, Ore., Nov. 15.—(AP)—

Unless some of the players are incapacitated from injuries in practice this week, the University of Oregon will start its entire first team against Oregon State College in their annual football game at Corvallis Saturday. The three players who were injured in the California game—Sindelman, center; Robinson, half; and Christensen, tackle—have rejoined the team early this week and all are in fine condition.

Coach McEwan has been drilling his backfield in offensive play. Oregon lacked offensive power in the California game, mainly, McEwan believes, because he has been laying great stress on defensive play. Now with the defense working satisfactorily, the Wehfoot coach will concentrate the rest of the week on his attack.

It is no secret that McEwan will bank heavily on forward passes for yardage. The Orange-red also use the aerial as their most effective weapon, so the contest may develop into a battle of the air.

JACKSON COUNTY RATIO IS LOWERED, TAX BODY SHOWS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 15.—(AP)—

The state tax commission has made public the tax ratios of the Oregon counties, showing the percentage that the assessed valuation of property in the several counties bears to the actual valuation.

The ratios of 29 counties remain the same as last year. The ratios of nine are increased. These are Columbia, Grant, Hood River, Lincoln, Tillamook, Union, Wallowa, Wasco and Washington. Seven show decreases. They are Curry, Harney, Jackson, Klamath, Lake, Umatilla and Wheeler.

Changes as compared with last year's ratios range from one to five points. Lake county has decreased from 79 to 74 and Wasco has increased from 71 to 75. These are the most marked changes.

The highest ratio in the state is Sherman county, which is 85 per cent. The lowest is Clackamas, which is 42.

PORTLAND SLEUTH TO GUARD HOOVER

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 15.—(AP)—

William S. (Bill) McSwain, since 1921 head of the Portland office of the United States secret service, will be in charge of the secret service guard which accompanies President-elect Herbert Hoover on his South American trip. The announcement was made today by secret service offices here. McSwain left yesterday for Palo Alto and is expected to sail with Hoover from San Pedro, on the super-dreadnaught Maryland, to remain with the president-elect until his inauguration.

During his connection with the secret service McSwain has served two presidents in this capacity. He traveled with Warren G. Harding and was with President Wilson when he made his trip west.

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COURT OVERRULES STEWART PROTEST IN PERJURY CASE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—

Over the protest of the defense in the perjury trial of Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, Justice Jennings Bailey today permitted testimony given by the oil man to the senate public lands committee last April 24, to go before the jury.

With Senator Nye of North Dakota on the stand, government counsel brought up the April testimony, when Stewart had revealed that \$759,000 of Continental Trading company bonds had been received by him and turned over to a trustee. The court inquired whether Stewart had been sworn on that occasion, as he was on February 2 and 3, when it is charged that he perjured himself in denying knowledge of any distribution of bonds by the company. "No, he was not," said Nye, explaining that it was not the custom to swear a senate committee witness when they appeared a second time.

The objection of Frank Hogan, defense counsel, against admission of the April testimony, was overruled by the court.

BIG TEN SCRAMBLE MAY BE COMPLICATED BY SATURDAY GAME

CHICAGO, Nov. 15.—(AP)—

The race for Big Ten championship honors won't be ended by the Iowa-Wisconsin game Saturday if Minnesota and Michigan succeed in their ambitions to scramble the conference standings.

Only a victory Saturday and another November 24 can insure either Iowa or Wisconsin a clear claim to the championship. A defeat for either or both would allow Ohio and Illinois a chance to tie for the title.

Whether Iowa or Wisconsin wins, they face later stumbling blocks in Michigan and Minnesota. Iowa must meet Michigan's up and coming eleven November 24, while Wisconsin faces a final game with its traditional rival, Minnesota, the same day.

With ten-conference opponents carded for this week, Minnesota and Michigan have forgotten everything but the two championship contenders—Iowa and Wisconsin—and are working overtime for next week's games. Minnesota, especially, looks dangerous for its game against Wisconsin.

Twelve times since 1896, when the championship race became an annual prize, two or more teams have been deadlocked at the finale of the percentage column. The Iowa-Wisconsin game, this Saturday's elimination battle, apparently will be straight football against forward passes. Wisconsin has developed a passing game and it is likely to be unleashed at the first opportunity. Iowa on the other hand, will depend on straight smashes and flying wedge plays.

KIMBALL HOME IS BOMB TARGET

KENOSHA, Wis., Nov. 15.—(AP)—

The bombing of Roger Kimball's summer home at Lake Geneva last night has added another chapter of violence to the Allen A. Mills labor difficulties.

The \$25,000 home of Mr. Kimball, vice president and general manager of the company, was the twenty-first target of bombs which police attribute to the strike, or lookout, in force at the mills here. This latest outbreak, the first directed against an official of the company, caused Kenosha police to redouble efforts to prevent similar violence, which has persisted for several months.

ARGENTINA ENVOY LEAVES FOR HOME

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—(AP)—

Ambassador Manuel Mellero of Argentina will leave Washington for Argentina tomorrow. The cause of his departure has not been disclosed, but diplomatic circles believed that his leaving would mean the end of his ambassadorship to the United States.

Ambassador Mellero came to the United States in September of this year. He succeeded Ambassador Perry, who resigned after a disagreement with his government when he represented Argentina at the Pan-American conference at Havana this year. The only statement from the ambassador was that he was going to Argentina to accompany his wife and children back to Washington.

Plane Safe

OAKLAND, Cal., Nov. 15.—(AP)—Joseph Burrows, Oakland airport pilot, telegraphed airport officials today that he had been forced down at Austin, Tex., and that both he and Frank Hall, his passenger, were safe. The message gave no details of the forced landing. The two had been missing more than 24 hours.

ROCKNE TO WATCH CARNEGIE BATTLE RECALLING UPSET

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Nov. 15.—

Knute Rockne has announced he will positively be on hand to personally direct his Notre Dame eleven when it clashes with Carnegie Tech on Carter field Saturday.

Two years ago, Rockne learned a lesson from Carnegie Tech and he hasn't forgotten it. He learned that no matter how weak Coach Wally Steffen's eleven, it is always dangerous.

Notre Dame was headed toward a national football championship in 1924 when the team invaded Carnegie Tech's ballfield. Satisfied his eleven was better by three touchdowns and that no master-minding was necessary, Rockne left direction in the hands of assistants and went to Chicago to watch the Army-Navy game. Later he saw handed a telegram: "Carnegie Tech 15; Notre Dame 0."

"Someone is kidding me," Rockne countered, only to learn that the score was accurate.

"They can't catch me again that way," Rockne commented. "Anyway, we are the underdogs this time as Carnegie Tech has defeated every team it has met this season."

Every ticket for the game has been sold, assuring a crowd of 20,000.

SEARCH INSTITUTED FOR LOST STUDENTS

LAKEPORT, Cal., Nov. 15.—(AP)—

Searching parties prepared today for an intensive hunt through the mountain districts around Upper lake, north of here, for four University of California students—two young men and two girls—who started for that district on a hiking trip last week end, and have been missing since.

The students in the party were: Misses Anna Julia Hamsperger, 21, and her twin sister, Minna, both registered at the university from Logan, Utah; Robert H. Koeler, 21, registered from Los Angeles, and John R. Dempster, 25, graduate student, who lives in Berkeley.

N. J., and which was so defective it could not be closed.

When Hampden went on duty in the fire room at four o'clock Sunday morning, he said, the chief engineer was warned that water was leaking through the hole into the coal bunkers, but two men were unable to force the door closed with heavy wooden hammers.

Fires Put Out.

When he went off duty at eight o'clock, he said, the water was ankle deep in the fire room, and when he returned at four in the afternoon it had already put out the fires under the starboard boiler and was coming in fast. Chief Engineer Avard Adams helped man the pumps, but the water entered so fast that a life line was rigged between the coal bunker and the furnace door to help the firemen keep their feet. Then it became so bad that two men supported the shovels to keep them from going down into the deep water or lunging into the open fireboxes.

At last, before he went off duty

at eight Sunday night, a bucket

of water was thrown on the

fires, and they were put out.

The water was so hot that

the firemen had to wear

protective clothing.

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brigade was passing coal from bunkers to furnace doors while bedroom stewards helped bath the boiler room. A heavy lurch on the ship sent the water up to the men's necks.

Up to this time, Hampden said, no S. O. S. had been sent out, although men had made the perilous journey from boiler room to bridge, after telephone communications went out, to keep Captain Carey informed of the situation.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—(AP)—Reclaimed from the sea, 27 bodies of the Vestris dead today were being returned to grieving relatives and friends.

The first body was brought to this city early yesterday on the rescue ship Berlin, while last night eight bodies were brought by the coast guard destroyers Tucker and Acushnet. The coast guard destroyer Shaw left the scene of the wreck for New York with 13 bodies.

Many of the dead had not been identified today, the clothing being devoid of identifying marks. Among the bodies aboard the Shaw were those of Major Yashio Inouye, Japanese consul at Buenos Aires, whose wife was rescued by the battleship Wyoming; Carl Franke, representative of a German firm, and his 22-year-old daughter, Ingeborg.

Of the four bodies brought by the Tucker, only two were identified. Brass tags worn about the necks identified one as that of Jose Gonzales Rua of New Bedford, Mass., and the other as that of Raymond Garcia Polal of New York.

Rua, who had sailed with his wife and two-year-old son, had \$780 in his pockets when found. His wife was rescued by the Wyoming, but no trace of the son was found.

The two other bodies were those of a negro woman and a white man, apparently a member of the crew.

Aboard the Acushnet were the bodies of Ralph P. Whitehead, of Woodstock, N. Y., and Tom Jones, barman of the Vestris. The identity of the other two was not known.

The body brought back by the Berlin was that of a white man, who was not identified.

The destroyers landed the bodies at Stapleton, Staten Island, where they were met by a representative of the Lamport and Holt line, the owners of the Vestris, and an undertaker.
