Eighty-six fires in Oregon, outside of Portland, during October resulted in losses of approximately \$250,000, according to a report prepared by Clarence A. Lee, state fire marshal. This was \$600,000 less than during the month of October, 1927. The loss for September, 1928, was \$217,222. The fire loss for the ten months' period ended October 31, 1928, was \$3,885,000, or approximately \$1,000,000 more than for each of the corresponding periods of 1925 and 1927.
