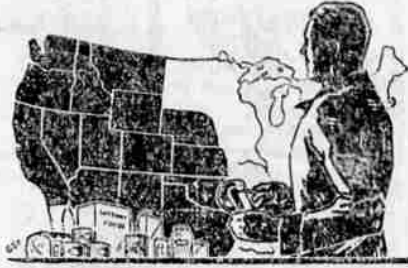

COUNTY CONTEST INAUGURATED BY HEALTH WORKERS

To stimulate interest in the Christmas seal as well as in ancient Phoenician and Roman sea lore, a county contest will be conducted, centering around the design of the 1928 Christmas seal. A conjunction with a model contest conducted by the state.

The county contest will have three divisions, Classes I, II and III. Class I will be for posters or sketches, class II will be for signs, class III for small models constructed of wood, soap or other appropriate modeling material. The contest will be further subdivided into divisions A and B. A will include all school children in the grade schools, division B all students in junior high or high schools or corresponding classes in private or other schools.

The Christmas seal for 1928 is a Roman galley, such as was used by the mariners of the Mediterranean thus called a Mediterranean galley in the hunt for gems, gold and valuable stuffs for the busy markets of Rome, Athens, Byzantium and Phoenicia. Julius Caesar transported his legions in such ships. The Christmas seal has, however, another mission. The money derived from its sale is used to prevent the spread of disease.

The early vessels were mostly crescent shaped, high at the bow and stern. They had banks or ramps at the bow for use in running down and stowing other ships. The masts, spars and sails were all removed in a fight, and the principal means of propelling the ship was by the oars. These oars were arranged in one, two or three "banks." The space between the sides was not decked over and the rowers sat on benches exposed to the weather. A walk ran down the middle of the ship from bow to stern, where the slave-drivers walked with whips to encourage the rowers. At the bow and stern were small decks for the fighting men, and at the stern was a canopy, deck house or tent for the commander. Early ships had but one mast and sail, but the later ones had three masts, each with a big sail. The sail at the stern, called a lateen sail, was triangular in shape. All sails were fastened to yards that hung crosswise of the masts. On many Roman ships the main yard, or yard on the middle mast, was curved in shape. These ships were all decorated elaborately, with fancy designs at bow and stern. They were steered by an oar over the stern, or hanging over the left side near the stern. Some had an oar on each side of the stern. These oars were much larger and heavier than the rowing oars. The sails were usually colored and sailed.

Ancient histories, Caesar's Gallic War, and other books used in the schools, often contain illustrations of these ships.

1. The contest is limited to pupils in the various public and private schools in the county. Division A includes the grammar grades, division B the junior high and high schools.

Class I—Posters or sketches.

Class II—Cross-stitch, embroidery, etc.

Class III—Models of wood, soap, clay, etc.

Contestants may secure assistance in the development of details but not in actual construction of entries.

2. All entries must be completed

and delivered to places listed in 11, not later than December 29, 1928.

3. Entries should not be exact copies of the Christmas seal or the master model of the Christmas seal, but of that type. They must not be exact copies or tracings of illustrations in books.

4. Models must not be made from commercial parts or kits.

5. Entries should be a Phoenician, Roman or Greek ship, or the general type of "early Mediterranean galley," resembling the Christmas seal argosy of 1928.

6. The mainsail must be white and the one double-banked cross insignia of the anti-tuberculosis campaign in bright red. From one to three sails may be used.

7. All entries must bear the name and address of the entrant, either on the back or reverse, or attached by tag to cross-stitch samples or models.

8. The committee will use the utmost care in handling entries while in their hands, but will assume no responsibility for them in case of damage.

9. Prize winning models become the property of the Anti-Tuberculosis association, with the understanding that any prize winning models sold, the proceeds of such sale, over and above the amount of the prize awarded, will be paid to the entrant.

10. Entries, other than prize winners, will be returned to the entrants at their expense, upon request. Entries, other than prize winners, if sold, will be treated as (9) above, and the money realized over expenses, paid to the entrant.

11. Detailed plans for the ship-building contest may be copied from the leaflets deposited with all manual training teachers, offices of Ashland Tidings and Gold Hill News, and the Browne Hardware company in Medford.
