GERMANI, NOTED YOUNG ORGANIST, MEDFORD TONIGHT

This city is included in the first transcontinental tour of the world's youngest organ virtuoso who will appear at 8:15 tonight at the Presbyterian church.

The player is Silvio Ferrando (General), 21-year-old organist of the Augusteo orchestra at Rome, Italy, who was a child prodigy and came to America last season to make a highly successful debut, as the result of which he was engaged for a transcontinental tour, which will take him this season to the Pacific coast and back.

It is said that Germani is the youngest organist ever to cross the Atlantic for a concert tour. Not since the historic concert tours of Coublin and Dupre, has an organist aroused such enthusiasm.

Germani, like his gifted colleagues, has the faculty of winning the warm admiration of the general public as well as members of his own profession. He has in fact, "the gift of moving crowds," as the late James Huneker so aptly expressed it.

The praise showered on Germani by the cities of New York and Philadelphia is already a matter of history. After his recital at Springfield, Mass., the Republican described the event as follows: "This young man ranked lastly on to the platform, gave the large audience a friendly nod and without further ado entered on a program which is probably one of the most satisfactory recitals to have been given here since Dupre and Coublin appeared.

His playing is brilliant, he has a certain mature quality, also amazing, in his technique and masterful use of the instrument."

At Princeton university, Williams College, New Jersey College for Women in New Brunswick, in Boston and in Montreal Germani met with further acclaim. Great interest is being shown here in Germani's coming recital tonight.
