

MASONIC BUILDING IN ASHLAND OPEN BANQUET ENJOYED

ASHLAND, Ore., Nov. 17.—(Special)—Through a long period of 48 years working, waiting and planning Alpha Chapter No. 1 of the Oregon Eastern Star, of Ashland, has finally come into possession of a modern and well equipped lodge home in the Masonic building which has just been retroceded on the second floor with an addition of a third floor.

On Friday night, Nov. 16th, the chapter gave a splendid checkered dinner to the Masons and their wives. The Eastern Star members and their husbands and to others of their friends in celebration of the completion of the new home.

About 240 persons enjoyed the hospitality of the lodge and the excellent meal. J. Henry Hardy, worthy patron of the Star, presided as toastmaster and introduced the speakers. Mrs. Helen Dickerson McCullen, worthy patron of Alpha Chapter No. 1, in a very pleasing and forceful manner, expressed the appreciation of the members of the organization for the recognition given the ladies in planning and remodeling the building and also voiced her personal pleasure at being worthy patron during the year of the improvement to which many of her predecessors had looked forward from year to year. Millard Grung, high priest of the chapter chairman of the building committee, told something of the work connected with the improvement and thanked the members of his committee for their assistance.

R. E. Detrick, eminent commander of the Knights Templar, spoke briefly of his appreciation of the new quarters.

Rev. P. K. Hammond, potentate of the Shrine, was introduced as chief speaker of the evening and, in his usual happy and entertaining manner, led the thought of his hearers through an interesting discourse, brief but to the point, and convulsed his friends with laughter at several points of his talk.

Malone, worshipful master of the Blue lodge, was generous in his praise of the work of the building committee and expressed the thanks of the gathering to the ladies for the wonderful spread.
