CANDIDATES MUST FILE REPORT OF ELECTION EXPENSE

Because a state law requires it, all the candidates who ran for city office at the recent election are required to file with the city recorder not later than next Wednesday a list of their itemized campaign expenses.

When last Saturday forenoon only two of the candidates had filed such lists, Earl H. Fehl, defeated candidate for mayor, and E. A. Wilson, successful candidate for city councilman. City Recorder E. A. Alford got busy on the telephone and tried to reach as many of the candidates as possible, who had not reported, and warn them to do so in time, as the law provides a penalty of \$25 a day for each day such filing is delayed beyond the legally fixed time.

By this noon only four out of the candidates who ran for office at the city election had filed. Unless the others do so by Wednesday afternoon at 4:40 o'clock, when the city recorder's office closes for the day, they will be subject to the \$25 a day violation penalty.

"If when the time for filing passes by I discover that my campaign expenses have not been filed, I can quietly slip them in the records." However, it is safe to venture that Recorder Alford's expenses for his successful re-election campaign were the first filed, although he gave out the information that Earl Fehl was the first to file such a list.

RECOVERY ASSURED FOR MRS. VAN NUYS

Recovery of Mrs. Willis C. Van Nuy, who suffered three scalp bullet wounds Friday morning when shot by her husband, who then killed himself, was assured today, according to reports from the Community hospital, where the wounded woman has shown gradual improvement since her arrival there. The body of her husband, who died from a bullet wound, self-inflicted through the mouth and head, was shipped last night to Turner, Ore., and was accompanied by the dead man's father, C. E. Van Nuy.

In a statement to Chief of Police McCredie Friday afternoon, Mrs. Van Nuy claimed there had been a quarrel and that her husband had become angered because of her physical inability to work as the result of sickness. However, Saturday afternoon, she said that her husband was intoxicated at the time of the shooting and that she did not know why he shot. She denied there was a quarrel and said that during the seven years she had been married to him that she had never lived with him for more than three months at a time.
