

### SCHOOL CHILDREN AIDED TO HIGHER HEALTH STANDARD

With approximately 70 per cent of all school children in America suffering from physical defects, Red Cross public health nursing service is planning to intensify its work in the schools during the coming year in an effort to prevent and correct these defects, which are said to be a menace to the development of children and a deterrent to effective scholarship.

Figures on the year's work in Oregon show that 583 visits to homes have been made by nurses in behalf of cases, 23 health conferences, lectures and demonstrations have been held which were attended by more than 1205 persons; and as a result of 620 visits to schoolrooms, 10,989 children have been inspected.

One result of the work among the school children, it is pointed out, is a noteworthy saving to school administrations. The correction of physical defects, such as bad teeth, defective eyes, impaired hearing, diseased tonsils, etc., results in better scholarship and therefore a decrease in the number of "repeaters." Some authorities say that it does not cost a school administration less than an average of \$150 for every school boy or girl who has to repeat a grade, while health authorities state that a large majority of failures are caused by physical defects in the child rather than natural inability or indifference.

Searching out the defects in the children, which often go for years unnoticed, the nurses make efforts to have them corrected. When financial difficulties stand in the way of necessary operation, attention to teeth, or the procuring of eyeglasses, they assist the families in overcoming these difficulties.

The work in this state during the year is part of a national campaign the organization is conducting to improve health conditions in the nation. In every state, and in the insular and foreign possessions of the United States 745 public health nurses have been working under the Red Cross flag, and in the last 12 months have served more than 2,300,000 persons.

Miss Mildred Carlton and Mrs. Lewis Ulrich as president and secretary together with Mrs. Alice Holloway, county seal sale chairman, arranged the meeting whose attendees included representatives of the nine community health groups from all sections of the county. Each group is responsible for the sale in its own community so naturally they were eager to learn how to make it a big success and thus fight tuberculosis.

Window displays featuring health work, nurses' activities, etc., are being planned by the groups who can locate accommodating stores for the purpose of showing just what the seal money goes for.

A county ship making contest, following the lines of the national contest, is part of the educational publicity being announced through the 90 schools of this county as well as through the newspapers.

The appeal is to old and young alike to make a ship in keeping with the spirit of the "Agony of Health" which decorates the 1928 Christmas seal. The liberal classifications in the contest allow for various kinds of workmanship in making the ship of wood, wax, clay, soap, cross-stitched or embroidered cloth, colored posters, etc.

One instance of doubled expenses which depend upon money from the seals was announced by Miss Carlton when she explained that the dental clinic would have to be open two days a week instead of one as during last winter and that Dr. Mulholland was making very satisfactory arrangements for it.

### NEGRO BOOTBLACK LORD INVERCLYDE SENTENCED DEATH FOR GIRL MURDER

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Death in the electric chair, Illinois' new and untried mode of execution, was fixed by a circuit court jury last night as David Shank's punishment for the murder of Miss Jennie Meta Constance.

The trial ended as quickly as the negro bootblack had admitted slugging Miss Constance, an English teacher at Bradley Polytechnic institute, Peoria, Ill., on the night of August 14. Attorneys suddenly waived closing arguments, and the jury's verdict followed in 40 minutes.

Miss Constance, a post-graduate student in Northwestern university summer school, was waylaid, beaten and robbed near the university campus. Shank's sale of her wrist watch, his only loot, led to his arrest a few days later. He confessed immediately.

Shank's attorneys had entered a plea of not guilty on the ground that the slayer was insane. The jury, however, voted unanimously that he was sane although illiterate.

### LORD INVERCLYDE GRANTED DIVORCE

EDINBURGH, Nov. 20.—(AP)—Lord Inverclyde, one of England's richest peers, today was granted a divorce from Lady Inverclyde.

Lord Inverclyde sought the decree on the ground of an alleged infidelity in a Paris hotel last June. The main evidence in the suit, which was not defended, was taken on commission. After oral testimony today from Lord Inverclyde, his London butler and Lady Inverclyde's former maid, the court granted the decree.

Lord Inverclyde inherited more than 2,000,000 pounds (\$10,000,000) when he succeeded his father in 1919. His marriage to Olive Sylvia Sainsbury was one of the leading social events of 1920. One incident of the wedding was the failure of Lord Inverclyde to appear until 15 minutes after the time set for the ceremony.

Lady Inverclyde is the daughter of Arthur Sainsbury, a provision merchant known all over England. She is a keen sportswoman, fond of hunting, tennis and swimming. Lord Inverclyde is the grandson of one of the founders of the Cunard line. He has been assistant to the secretary for Scotland.

### SHERIFFS FRAMED HUSBAND'S CRIME WIDOW ALLEGES

EMORY, Texas, Nov. 20.—(AP) A widow's allegation that her slain husband and another man were led into a faked bank robbery, "framed" by six men, three of whom were west Texas sheriffs, and then shot down for the \$5000 rewards they alleged slayers expected to collect from the State Bankers' association, was on file here today.

Mrs. Mary Hansen made the assertion, in a \$100,000 damage suit entered yesterday against the association, Sheriff Reader Webb of Hector county, Sheriff A. C. Francis of Midland county, Sheriff Bud Barefield of Upton county and J. W. B. Hogan. Two other men were named in the papers, but not made parties to the suit.

William Carl Hansen and an unidentified man were killed before the doors of the Citizens' National bank at Odessa, Tex., November 25, 1927. Mrs. Hansen's suit charges that to collect the standing reward posted by the association for dead bandits, the three sheriffs, Hogan, "Red" Wood and J. H. Dumas executed the alleged conspiracy.

Wood and Dumas are under Upton county indictments charging murder and conspiracy to murder in the killing of two supposed bank robbers at Rankin, Tex., some time ago. They are slated for trial in Travis county (Austin) soon. They were indicted largely through the efforts of Ranger Captain Frank Hamer, who some months ago, charged in a signed statement that "a murder ring" had been spawned of men desirous of getting \$5000 rewards for each man they could lead into "cooked up" bank robberies.

The Bankers' association posted the reward last year.
