

HUMANE SOCIETY BACKS CONTEST FOR BEST POSTER

To substitute children for the work of the Jackson County Humane Society, the following address was broadcast from the 11th Annual Convention for Mrs. E. E. W. on Monday, November 19, 1928.

"Our object in coming to you over the radio this evening is to urge you to make the children of this county and to hope that most of their parents in connection with our humane work and our national humane poster contest, October 21, 1928."

"For the benefit of the public in general we wish to control the impression that the humane movement cares for nothing but animals. On this date, November 19, the American Humane Association is holding its annual convention in New Orleans. In there are three working days at this convention and I want to read you their program."

"You will notice that two-thirds of the conventional work is devoted to the child—not to the animal."

"Fortunately, in Jackson county the poverty of the big cities and industrial centers is unknown. Our country is 100 per cent American and we have such able organizations looking after the welfare of our children and that the

Jackson County Humane Society has been called upon to devote its service to animals. However, we are, and have at all times been ready and willing to promote any act of cruelty to children in the full extent of the law."

The state laws of Oregon require that one-half hour each week be devoted to humane education in our schools. The reason for this is two-fold: (1) Character building; to awaken in the heart of every child the impulse of kindness to all living creatures; (2) The protection of our animals and the prevention of cruelty."

The Jackson County Humane Society, feeling that it can assist the county teachers in this branch of their work in taking this means to acquaint them with our national humane poster contest, this contest is put on each year by the National Humane Association of Albany, N. Y., and carries with it \$200 in cash prizes. The contest gives all of our children an equal chance in the contest, according to their age and advancement."

The Jackson County Humane Society has complete information on this contest with sample posters in its possession, all available to each teacher. Those of you who visited the exhibit of the Humane Society at our last county fair may remember the collection of posters made by children from all over the United States and the remarkable interest of our children as well as their parents in studying these posters. It may be safely said, therefore, that the ground work in this county has already been laid.

"We will take pleasure in being of service to you and know, thru the poster work of your children exhibited at the fair on other subjects that they can make a creditable showing in this national humane competition."

"At this time the Jackson County Humane Society is placing in each school of the county a yearly subscription to the 'American Humane Review', a national publication dealing entirely with humane topics and having for one of its objects the co-ordinating of the school with the activities of humane work."
