

# DELAY ACTION SIXTH STREET LIGHT SYSTEM

### Assessment Question Holds Up Ordinance for New Lighting — Park Avenue Paving Authorized—Vote Is Canvassed By Council

Quite a grist of important and routine business was acted on by the city council last night, and because of the absence of Mayor Alexander, in whose place Councilman A. C. Hubbard, chairman of the committee on finance, presided, action on some other matters was postponed.

It being the last night for possible objections to be heard before the passage of ordinances providing for a new street lighting system for Sixth street and for the paving of Park avenue, an ordinance to pave that street was passed and it was decided to hold a special meeting next Tuesday night to receive bids on both black-top and concrete.

However, action on the Sixth street lighting question was delayed until it can be ascertained beyond doubt that the property owners of that street can be assessed under the Hancock act providing for the 10-year payment plan, as a question has been raised as to whether this is legally permissible for lighting. Then, too, there is some talk about the Sixth street property owners considering a plan by which they would pay their assessments in cash.

Incidentally, a petition was received by the council last night from the property owners on Verde avenue, between East Main street and East Ninth street, asking for the installation of a modern street lighting system in the territory named.

**Petition Filed.**  
This petition was placed on file, and inasmuch as Main street and some of the other cross business streets are expected to also follow the example set by Sixth street in seeking a modern lighting system, it was suggested by some of the councilmen that action on the Sixth street and Riverside petitions be delayed until all petitions were in, and cover them all in the passage of one ordinance, from the motive of economy in advertising, etc.

This brought out the explanation from Jack Thompson, local manager of the California Oregon Power company, that the property owners of Sixth street would insist that their proposition be considered separately from all others. None of the Sixth street property owners were present last night.

The vote of the city cast at the recent city election, held at the same time as the state and national election, was canvassed, and the city budget ordinance passed.

A number of ordinances were passed relating to the sale of individual city properties and delinquent property settlements and property changes. The sales involving city property amounted to about \$3000.

Petitions for street lights in various neighborhoods were referred to the council committee on lighting, and petitions for minor street repairs were referred to the city superintendent and committee on streets.

Mrs. Louisa Job of Chicago testified that her husband had bargained to sell her for \$50 down and \$25 on delivery, but that she refused to be delivered.

# CITY COUNCIL TO PURCHASE EQUIPMENT

### Street Repair Machinery Recommended by Committee Is Authorized at Cost of \$7200 — Extra Help Not Needed.

The purchase of additional street repairing and building equipment for the city at a cost of \$7200 was decided on by the city council last night, after that body had heard and approved the report on that subject of the council committee on streets, as follows:

There has just recently been turned over to the city the sum of \$6,931.54, this amount is from the county for taxes levied by them in 1928 for general road purposes. Upon receiving the above amount your street and road committee called a meeting asking all property owners requesting street improvements to attend and register their wants for street and road improvements. At this meeting we were requested to build a sidewalk along Summit avenue from West Fourth street to West Jackson street, also install a culvert at the corner of North Holly street and West Third street. These requests have been taken care of without drawing from the fund turned over by the county.

The question of purchasing additional street equipment for the city has long been discussed by your committee and we now recommend that the following equipment be purchased:

- 1 one-man road main-liner with 12-foot blade and tractor attachment to cost \$3,500.00
- 1 5-ton tandem roller to cost 1,800.00
- 1 2-jackhammer air compressor to cost 1,800.00

This amount is in excess of the sum received from the county, however we feel the city is badly in need of this equipment and that one half of the cost of equipment can be paid this year and the balance in 1929 from the street and road funds.

We understand it will also be necessary to pay a portion of the cost of outfitting the Greater Lake highway and the Golf course road from this fund which will total about \$1,000. These two improvements are within the city limits. Deducing this amount from the \$6,931.54 there is a balance of \$5,931.54. If one-half the cost of the equipment is paid from this, it will leave a balance of \$2,300.00 to operate the equipment and purchase additional pipe and material.

At the present time we have in operation only one one-man grader which is not adequate to properly maintain the 68 miles of dirt and gravelled streets.

The tandem roller will be used for street patching purposes, and will eliminate the hand roller now in use. We can purchase asphalt in 1000 pound batches from the Herold asphalt plant for \$3.00 per batch and with the use of a power roller, patches in the pavement can be made at considerable saving.

The method of breaking the pavement for sewer and water connections with hand drilling is too costly, and your committee desire it an act of economy to purchase an air compressor.

Should the above equipment be secured no additional help will be required to operate the machines as the men now in the employ of the street and road department can operate them.

Paris, Constantinople, Pompeii, Babylon, Carthage, Athens, — dreams, to most of us, — reality to Mr. and Mrs. Harold McDonald, who returned to Medford yesterday, after two years' travel in Europe and Asia, where Mr. McDonald was employed as sales manager for a caterpillar tractor company.

And 11-months-old Richard, who was born in Paris, was with them. Richard's name was given a different accent wherever they went, according to Mrs. McDonald, the former Lucille Saunders of the Oregonian staff. In Paris the accent was on the last syllable, and in Italy they called him Ricardo. Now that they're back in the United States, the tiny, golden-haired Parisian will in all probability be called Dick.

Too weary, after the long trip, to go into details the couple, who are visiting for a while at the home of Mr. McDonald's parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. McDonald, accommodated a Mail Tribune reporter with a few incidents from their wealth of experiences abroad.

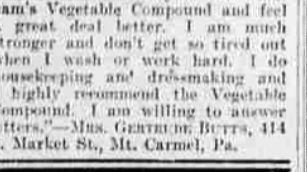
Shah Absent

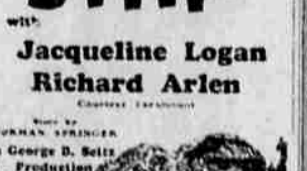

Alphabet Changed  
The most popular publication in Constantinople now, according to Mrs. McDonald, is the new alphabet, which is an adaptation of some of the European letters, as applied to the sounds of the native language. Copies of this alphabet are sold on the streets of Constantinople much as the Saturday Evening Post or the daily newspapers are sold here.

The schools all over Turkey are opening late this year, to allow time for the publication of the new text books which include the improved alphabet.

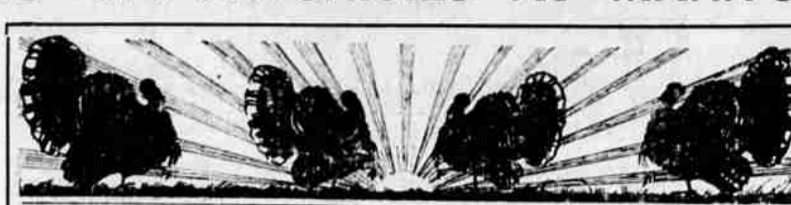
