BRITISH CHALLENGE FOR SUPREMACY IN AUTOMOBILE MAKING

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 21.—(AP)—With the mention of "challenging" American supremacy in the world's automobile market, three of the leading British firms will be amalgamated under the name of Humber, Limited. The firms are Humber Cars, Ltd., Humber, Ltd., and Hillman Motor Car Co., Ltd.

"We mean to concentrate on producing a car which will win a place in the world's markets and excel any American car of equivalent price," an official of one of the companies said. He added that the eventual aim of the amalgamation was to rival the General Motors Company of America.

The new combine will have an initial capital of 1,250,000 pounds. No public issue of shares is intended.

COUNTY RECEIVES FOREST RECEIPTS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22.—(AP)—A total of \$171,438.19, representing the state's 25 per cent of national forest receipts collected by the federal government, was apportioned by Secretary of State Hoss yesterday to the 31 Oregon counties that have national forest areas within their borders. The government's receipts are from sales of land, rental and some other sources. The total acreage of national forest reserve in the state is 13,278,866.

The largest apportionment goes to Klamath county, its share being \$27,062.20. Deschutes receives \$14,344.65; Douglas, \$10,162.78; Jackson, \$28,573.98; Lake, \$10,229.05; Lane, \$16,496.53; Wallowa, \$19,822.28, and the others smaller amounts.

Marion county receives \$2,640.73 and Polk \$11.79.

SALVATION ARMY DRIVE SHORT OF OBJECTIVE

The following is a statement of the income from the recent Salvation Army campaign which started Tuesday, November 6, and ended Tuesday, November 19: The campaign budget was set for the amount of \$2500. Of this amount \$441 cash and \$83 in pledges was raised during the period of the campaign, or about 20 per cent of the first objective. Adjutant Buchanan states that this amount is far inadequate to take care of the needs of the army in Medford for the coming year.
