SPOKANE, Nov. 22.—(AP)—The fallacious fancy that spuds and slyphs are strangers is all wrong, potato men think today.

Potato flappers can safely eat these succulent tubers without endangering that modish figure, it was asserted by W. P. Romans, manager of the Pacific Northwest Potato Growers' association, now in convention here.

"The old notion that potatoes should be tabooed by those seeking leanness," he declared, "has been dispated by scientific discoveries. One leading food authority declared that if the average American would eat four or five times as many potatoes as he now eats, the result would be a marked increase in physical fitness and freedom from crippling illnesses."

### PIONEER FILM ACTOR DEAD IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 22.—(AP)—Edward J. Connelly, 74-year-old character actor of the screen and stage, who died here yesterday of influenza, held the record for continuous service as an actor in any motion picture studio.

He was also the oldest member of the Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer company, with whom he had been under contract for 14 years as a featured player.

Born in New York City, Connelly started his career as a reporter on the New York Sun in the 1890s and then took up acting. After playing a number of featured roles, he leaped into fame opposite Edna May in "The Belle of New York."

### Great Business Men Vie in Their Contributions to British Charities



Enormous contributions to charity have recently been made by two outstandingly successful British subjects. Lord Woolavington (left), a Scotchman, has given \$875,000, and Bernhard Baron (right), a Jew, formerly an American citizen but now a British subject, has established a \$2,500,000 trust fund for orphans and crippled children.

LONDON (AP)—A Scotchman and a Jew are running a close race in giving money to charity in England.

The principals are Lord Woolavington, the Scotch whiskey distiller, and Bernhard Baron, the Jewish cigar maker, who won his fortune in the United States and came to England to increase it. Baron's recent gift of \$2,500,000 for the establishment of a trust fund for orphans and crippled children has been followed quickly by a gift of \$875,000 to charity on the part of Lord Woolavington. Altogether the total of Baron's benefactions is about \$10,000,000. He has probably given away more money than Woolavington but his wealth is "one up" on Baron when it comes to playing the fairy godfather.

When Woolavington discovered his deceased brother's two daughters living in Jamesville, Wis., one working as a factory tylist, he invited Catherine and Jean Buchanan to a holiday in London. Accompanying his invitation was a check for new clothes and transportation expenses. Afterward, in best story book style, Lord Woolavington made a settlement upon them which will provide handsomely for their future.
