

### COPCO DISPLAYS HOME PRODUCTION OF HONEY MAKERS

An unusual "home products" display, which is attracting lots of attention this week, is on exhibit in the east window of the Copco home office building.

The display features "two popular home products—Stewart's honey and Copco preferred stock" and both products are much in evidence in this attractive exhibit.

One of the most striking features of the display is a miniature hive of bees, real live ones, busy at work and paying little attention to the crowds of interested spectators. Honey from the Stewart apiculture is displayed in glass jars and pails, as well as in the comb.

The central figure of the exhibit is a most striking bee hive, in the shape of a big meter box, which was once in service on a Copco light pole on East Main Street. This box evidently looked good to a local colony of bees, so they promptly annexed it for a bee-hive, sealed up the cracks around the door and got busy making honey. Due to the fact that the meter was no longer in active service, they were not disturbed for some time, and when the Copco line crew came to salvage this equipment, they found it in this position. Although the Copco men are used to handling "hot stuff" they were not accustomed to herding a flock of bees and thought it advisable to call for some expert assistance from Jim Stewart of the Stewart Apiculture. Mr. Stewart came to the rescue, gathered up the colony of bees, removed the honey and returned the box to the power company. Here it serves a useful purpose as another one of the new famous Copco thrift exhibits. An appropriately worded poster in the display states as follows: "A Lesson in Thrift From Nature. Even the 'Busy Bee' Invests His Earnings in Copco Properties."

### Colombian Air "Ace" to Make 4,653 Mile Air Journey Home

ROCKAWAY NAVAL AIR STATION, N. Y., Nov. 23.—(AP)—Lieut. Benjamin Mendez, chief pilot of the republic of Colombia's air force, took off at 7:15 this morning for Jacksonville, Fla., on the first leg of a 4,653-mile flight to Bogota, his native capital.

Good weather conditions were forecast for his 3,910-mile flight to Florida.

A small group of Colombians, navy officers and army officers, and their wives from Mitchell Field were present when Mendez drove his big Curtiss seaplane across the water and into the air.
