WINDOW DISPLAYS GIVE CO-OPERATION IN HOME CAMPAIGN

The cooperation given the chamber of commerce in its Home Products Week campaign, which began last Monday, is shown in the many window displays made by local merchants, featuring home products only this week. A walk thru the business section of the city will disclose any number of interesting displays, featuring practically every product of Medford and vicinity.

The campaign has been meeting greater success than was expected and is arousing the interest of rural residents as well as those of Medford, as the campaign also is encouraging the purchase of valley grown products in preference to those shipped in from out of state points, giving the reason that local products are higher in quality and often cheaper in price.

The display windows at the chamber of commerce were filled today with local products in an interesting display, including food, pottery, candy, canned goods, butter, ice cream, jams, honey, beeswax, brooms, printing supplies, signs, potato ships and other articles manufactured in the city.

Included among the important home products made in Medford is Knight's Rogue River catsup. It enjoys a distribution which includes an extensive territory, with the Pacific coast states one of the main points of consumption. Made by the Knight Packing company, the catsup is regarded as having superior quality and compares favorably with any brand now on the market.

The firm has a large packing plant in this city and has been located in Medford for sometime, purchasing all of its supplies from local farmers and employing local help only, thus serving a double purpose in the exchange of money for the finished product. The company has three plants in the state of Oregon, with the main plant in Portland and branches in Medford and Cornelius, and has been in business for 25 years, shipping products to all parts of the United States.

Knight's catsup is a household word and is regarded by most housewives as a standard in catsup supplies.

Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—(AP) The stock market turned a complete somersault on a record-breaking turn-over today. A tremendous accumulation of overnight buying orders sent prices of many active issues soaring 2 to 2 1/2 points in the early trading, but a swift selling movement just before midday put down or wiped out many of the early gains, and sent a number of stocks 1 to 5 points below yesterday's final quotations. A brisk recovery was in progress in the early afternoon.

The market's ability to bounce back brought in fresh buying orders from speculators who had sold hastily and then rushed to get back their stock. On the up turn Canadian Pacific touched 259 1/2, a rise of 5 1/2 points and the best figure in more than 12 years. International Nickel and Midland Steel Products performed also advanced materially. Sensational performers like Wright Aero and Radio came up 19 to 15 points from their low levels on the drop. New Haven crossed 77 for the first time in several years. The closing was steady. Sales approximated 6,500,000 shares.
