SALEM, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—The State Tax commission has completed fixing the valuation of public utility property for assessment purposes in Oregon, and the total is \$175,699,164.43, which added to the assessed valuation of \$946,633,916 placed on local property by county assessors brings the grand total of assessed property valuation in the state up to \$1,122,332,180.43.

This is the valuation on which the tax levy for 1929 will be based. The removal of bank stock from taxation under a court decision is felt strongly, and it is less than last year's total of \$1,124,414,642.25.

Local property valuations this year are \$946,633,916, which is \$7,325,630 less than the local valuation of \$953,959,546 of the last year. The valuation of utility property has increased \$5,240,753.14.

The highest utility valuation in the state outside of Multnomah county is in Umatilla county, where utility assessed valuations aggregate \$11,679,107.69. Klamath county is next with \$10,843,722.26.

Inquiry today of a number of physicians developed the fact that while there is some flu extant locally, it is of a mild type and that many so-called flu cases are but cases of bad colds.

EXPRESS COMPANY ANTICIPATES MUCH HOLIDAY BUSINESS

Judging from various indications which he considers reliable, G. J. Gould, agent of the American Railway Express Co., here, made the prediction today that the holiday gift traffic this year would exceed all previous records and this will make it particularly urgent that people shop and ship early.

Recent incoming traffic from local retail stores, according to Mr. Gould, promises more elaborate display of suitable gifts and considerable business is expected by leading retail establishments from out-of-town customers.

"We are preparing for a record holiday traffic," said Mr. Gould, "and will be working up to the very late hours of Christmas Eve to make sure that all packages in our hands, up to that time, will be delivered before Christmas morning."

Most people who forward packages during the holidays, Mr. Gould added, are "occasional shippers" and are not usually familiar with the essentials of what transportation people call a "good package." Packing has become more or less a science and practically every kind of article can be so prepared as to guarantee perfect condition on arrival irrespective of its particular character.

Equally important is the marking or addressing of the package, for illegible or incorrect addresses invariably result in delays. It is particularly important to give the street and number of the receiver of the package, if located in a large city and in all cases care should be taken with the writing of the name of the state, especially when abbreviations are used.

It is often impossible to decipher such state abbreviations when hastily written. There are hundreds of cities and towns of the same name located in many different states. As the expressmen put it, a "shipment started right is half-way there."

Mr. Gould announced that he had a supply of special labels for Christmas express shipments which he would be glad to give to prospective holiday shippers.

GRANTS PASS TURKS SENT TO CALIFORNIA

GRANTS PASS, Ore., Nov. 24.—(AP)—Accepting county's turkey crop was being shipped this week to San Francisco for the Thanksgiving market. Nearly 5000 birds, or almost three carloads, were being shipped, the last cars leaving this evening.

The growers were receiving 25 cents a pound for the dressed turkeys. It was estimated that the turkeys being shipped will bring about \$25,000. There will be about 5000 birds left for the Christmas market.
