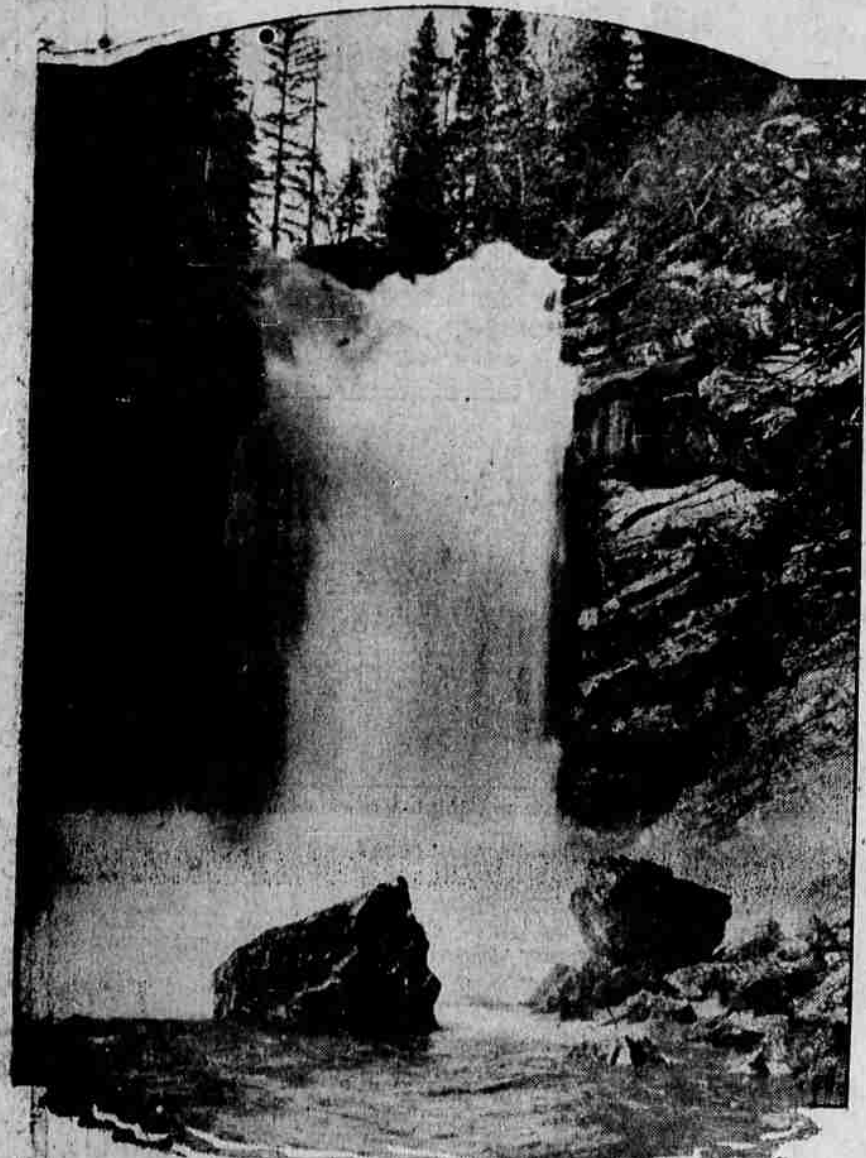

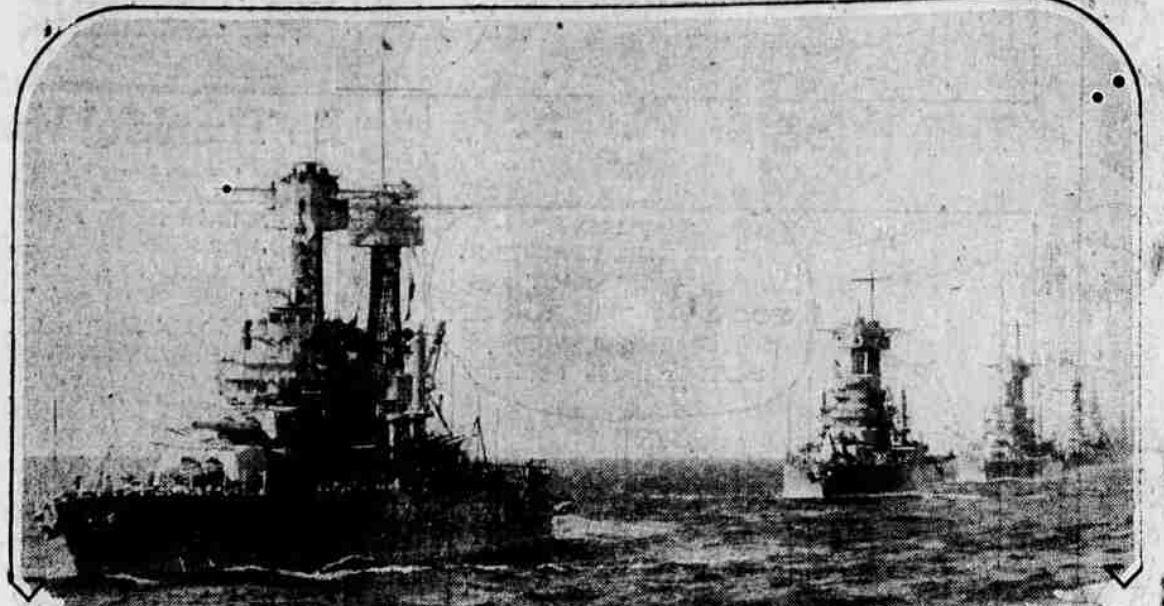

OLD GOLD and amethyst drops around a small gold and seed pearl chain make up this striking necklace, worn by Esther Ralston, screen star.



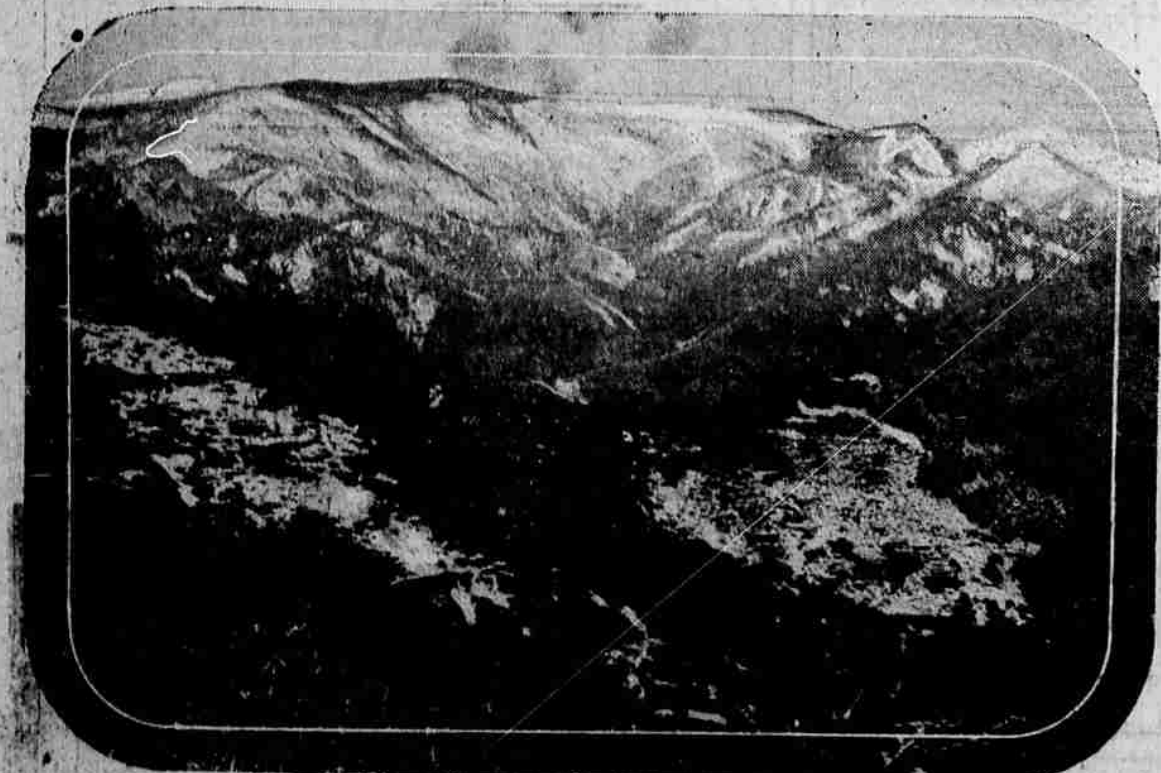
