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## \$2848 EXPENDED BY JACKSON G.O.P. REPORT REVEALS

None of the list of expenses filed so far by candidates and organizations of the city or Jackson county was more interesting to the local public than that of the Jackson county Republican central committee, because the majority of the money spent during the warm election campaign was in behalf of the unsuccessful reelection candidates of Judge C. M. Thomas and District Attorney Newton C. Chaney.

Vern L. Marshall, treasurer of this county committee filed the expense list of \$2848.25 with the state department at Salem last week.

Most of the money was spent in newspaper advertising, in which there was a race to attract the favorable attention of voters between the county central committee and the "Better Government League."

Inasmuch as the league spent all its money in newspaper advertising, the money spent by the county committee and the league for this purpose is about equal, as the league expenses filed, totaled to something over \$2,000.
