INFLUENZA HERE DIFFERENT FROM CALIFORNIA KIND

The situation throughout the city caused by the prevalence of many cases of severe colds or a light type of flu is about the same, new ones coming down with the ailments and others recovering and returning to their customary duties, daily. The flu type prevailing here is far different from the kind of severe flu epidemic prevailing in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The sickness situation in the public schools today was about the same as yesterday with 12 teachers unable to perform their duties, about 100 students of the junior, high school and from 50 to 40 from the senior high school and each of the grade schools ill at home.

Quite a number of stores and other business places are short of help because of the flu or bad cold illnesses among employees or proprietors.
