

# DEER INCREASE BRINGS DANGER OF STARVATION

### Protection By Man Has Destroyed Natural Balance—Acute Situation in Arizona—Elk Also Threatened.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Deer are growing so numerous in several of the national forests in the west that they are in danger of starvation—and most of their plight is due to their protection by man.

Everywhere on the national forests, the forest service pointed out today, the number of deer is increasing.

Man by his slaughter of mountain lions, wolves, lynxes and other prey animals has destroyed nature's balance. Now the chief natural checks on the deer are famine and disease, the forest service said.

When an excessive number of animals are seeking sustenance, a short forage crop, or a hard winter results in a struggle for life under which the weaker animals often succumb in large numbers.

At present, the forest service said, the most acute situation on any national forest is on the Kaibab forest in northern Arizona. The deer herd in this forest, numbering over 28,000, has outrun its food supply so that fawns born the previous year have died. A somewhat similar situation threatens the elk herds of the Yellowstone region in Wyoming and Montana.

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Wandering half starved into resorts, farms and gardens on the outskirts of cities, deer have become a nuisance in various parts of California, complaints testify. Last year the fish and game commission reported that 29,000 deer were killed in California, with Mendocino county holding the record with 1048 killed but nevertheless, sportsmen say they have been breeding much faster.

Recently Glendora farmers became irate because deer had been feasting in their avocado orchards, growers, they said, had no redress because it was unlawful to shoot the deer and they could not bring suit against the state for losses. They built fences to keep the animals off.

Deer herds in the Santa Monica mountains were reported endangering the life of rare plants in the California botanical gardens, especially the newly planted trees in the Hall of Fame, with the new real and laurel getting the most unwelcome attention. All wild life is protected in Mandeville canyon.

New Zealand is said to ship 1,000,000 deer yearly to the United States as venison.

# STEWARD SAYS VESTRIS CREW REFUSED HELP

### Lifeboat One-Third Full, Crew Refused Aid to Sinking Passengers—Radio Calls Told By Rescue Ship.

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP)—A first-class bedroom steward testified today that he got away from the sinking steamer Vestris in a lifeboat less than one-third filled and that when he suggested rescuing some passengers, was threatened with being struck over the head with an oar.

There were 15 men in the lifeboat, which had a capacity of between 50 and 60, he said. All but him were negro firemen, he said. "I suggested we cruise around and pick up some passengers," said Thomas Edwards, the steward, "but one of the firemen told me, 'If you don't shut up I'll kick you over the head with an oar.'"

Edwards testified at the investigation of the disaster being conducted by the United States steamboat inspection service.

"You didn't make any effort to pick up passengers, then?" he was asked by Dickerson Hoover, supervising inspector general, who is presiding at the hearing.

"No," said the steward. "What could I do? They were all against me."

Radio Calls. Testimony that Captain Carey of the British liner Vestris told a ship an hour after his SOS that he did not need help was on the record of the federal inquiry into the disaster today.

The radio log of the British liner Cedric showed that at 10:55 on the morning the Vestris sank, she received the message, "Thanks, don't need your help. Pressed Carey." It was an answer to her own message that she was 180 miles away and would come to the aid of the Vestris if needed.

No testimony was introduced to show why this was done, but the supposition was that Captain Carey expected to receive aid from nearer ships. Several nearer ships did aid in the rescue, but the steamer Beilan and the U. S. S. Wyoming, both of which were farther away than the Cedric, saved the lives of 31 persons.

PARIS, Nov. 27.—(AP) France, on the advice of the court of indictment today decided not to honor the extradition request of the United States for H. M. Blackmer, missing Teapot Dome witness.

His delivery to American officers was sought on an indictment charging him with making false income tax returns at Denver, Colo.

The second hearing in the case was held today and the court's opinion was then sent to the ministry of foreign affairs. Mr. Blackmer was immediately ordered liberated.

The French government attorney advocated refusal of the extradition on the ground that the offense was primarily political.

## ALARM FELT WHEN FLOOR IN VATICAN COLLAPSED TODAY

ROME, Nov. 27.—(AP) Two floors in the quarters of the Pontifical Guards of the Vatican caved in this morning. The accident caused considerable alarm to persons in the papal suite and measures were immediately taken to test the stability of floors and ceilings in the pope's private quarters.

The quarters of the guards and the pope's private apartments were constructed in the late years of the 18th century under the reign of Pope Pius VI.

On being informed of the mishap in the quarters of the guards the pope ordered that everything possible be done to avoid similar collapses elsewhere in the Apostolic palace.

## Wall Street Report

NEW YORK, Nov. 27.—(AP) The main price tendency in today's stock market was again upward although the market developed more irregularity than by most recent sessions, due to a rather general desire to take profits before the Thanksgiving day holiday. Copper and railroad shares were in the forefront of the advance, with a sprinkling of high priced specialties marked up 5 to 12 points by pool operators.

The late market showed wide contrasting fluctuations as news and shorts competed to govern the market's trend. Gains, however, were more numerous and substantial than losses. Russia Insurance reached 26 3/4, a gain of 1 3/4 points. Motor products and A. M. Bors went up ten points each, while Yellow Truck, Lehn and Fink, Interborough Rapid Transit and Worthington Pump preferred A moved 5 to 6 points higher. Curtis Aero sold down 7 points; Delaware and Hudson, Arch-Daniels-Midland 5 points each, Canadian Pacific and Wright Aero 3. Call money moved up 3 per cent. The closing was irregular. Sales approximated 5,000,000.

# RELIEF SESSION IS BAKERSFIELD, CAL., CONTINGENT UPON POLICE HUNTING BILL AGREEMENT FOR 'STRANGLER'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27.—(AP)—Conferences with members of the house and senate have failed to give President Coolidge any indications whether a farm relief bill may be passed at the coming regular session.

Mr. Coolidge feels that if the subject could be discussed and a decision arrived at without any great debate, a farm relief bill might well be passed at this session but it is the plan of members of congress and the new administration to have a special session he feels that the farm relief question might well go over until that time.

In the president's judgment the whole question as to whether a farm relief bill can be passed at the coming regular session centers around the ability of members of congress and people outside who are interested in the legislation to agree on a bill.
