Airplane Vogue
The tin wagon has been replaced by the miniature airplane that can actually fly in some instances for more than 800 feet. Lindy planes with complete motor attachments, run by electricity, are among the more popular toys of Santa's list this year, and have already been ordered in large quantities from the local toylands.
Then there are the sturdy brown army trucks, that could stand years of toyland warfare. In fact, these

Complete fire departments are going to be owned by some boys in Medford after December 25, because several of Santa's lists showed them. NEW PONTIAC IS ANNOUNCED BY OAKLAND CO.

PONTIAC, Mich., Nov. 27.—A Pontiac six, new in practically everything but name, shortly will appear on the market. It was announced here today by the Oakland Motor Car company. A bigger, smarter, more powerful and more luxurious Pontiac, bringing new features within the price range of the small six was promised by the Oakland Motor Car Co. This announcement comes near the close of the most successful year in the company's history with an estimated total output for 1928 of close to 275,000 units, 40 per cent above 1927.
In preparation for 1929, extensive building projects under way here for some time past are practically completed and will give the Oakland-Pontiac plant a capacity next year in excess of 350,000 cars. Production of parts for the new car is now under way at the company plant, said to be the most modern and best equipped in the industry. The new Pontiac six will be built almost entirely in factories owned by the Oakland Motor Car company and the Fisher body plant at Pontiac because the opening of the new production units will enable Oakland in 1929 to build parts formerly manufactured elsewhere. Keen interest in the new Pontiac six was evidenced in automobile circles here and at Detroit because the Pontiac first introduced in 1926 has since consistently shattered all previous sales records for a new make of car. While embodying big car features and performance, the new Pontiac six will remain within the price range of the smaller six, according to the announcement issued today.

National showings will be held around the first of the coming year and later in the show rooms of the Sanderson Motor company, local distributors.

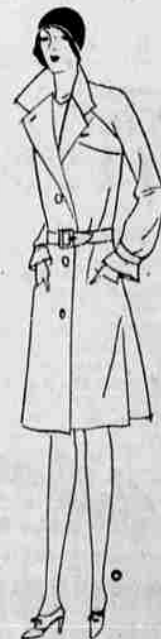
