BRITISH RECEIVE ANGLO-AMERICAN PARLEY PROPOSAL

LONDON, Nov. 28.—(AP)—The proposal by Fred A. Britten, chairman of the naval committee of the United States house of representatives, for an Anglo-American parley in Canada on the cruiser problem, was received with interest in British official quarters today.

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MOON ECLIPSE BROUGHT COLD SAVANT SAYS

Man in the Moon Needed Warm Clothes When the Earth Turned Off Heat—186 Below Zero.

PASADENA, Cal., Nov. 28.—(AP)—The man in the moon must have discarded his asbestos tuxedo for red flannels and a fur overcoat when the earth turned off its solar heater at the beginning of the lunar eclipse last night.

Dr. Edson Pettit, mount Wilson observatory astronomer, jabbed a figurative thermometer under the tongue of the man in the moon three times a minute during the two-hour eclipse, taking his temperature 360 times.

Before moonset earth intercepted her form between the sun's rays and the moon, the latter's pale face was perspiring under a temperature of about 228 degrees Fahrenheit, hotter than boiling water. During the total eclipse, Dr. Pettit said, this temperature dropped about 414 degrees to 140 degrees below zero—close to the coldness of liquid air.

Instead of growing whiter, the man in the moon's face grew redder as his temperature dropped. Sitting in a small darkened concrete room in the Snow observatory, Dr. Pettit took the moon's temperature with the aid of an intricate series of mirrors which played tag with slender moonbeams.

Other astronomers at Mount Wilson studied the modification of the solar spectrum during the eclipse. Alfred H. Joy, using the 100-inch instrument, the largest reflecting telescope in the world, was nearer the moon for all practical purposes than any other human being.
