

Play by Play Account of Medford-Benson Title Tilt

A crowd of more than 12,000 was on hand when Benson Tech took the field first. Medford followed two minutes later and both aggregations are warming up by tackling punts, forward passing and punting.

Medford won the toss and chose to kick off and defend the south goal.

First Period.

B. Hughes kicked off to Turzinski on his 15-yard line and he ran it back to the Benson 25-yard line. First down, 10 to go. Miller made no gain through center. Turzinski made five yards through left tackle. Miller punted to Melvin, who was downed on his own 20-yard line.

Morris stopped Harrell for one yard gain through center. Second down, nine yards to go. Melvin went around left end for 21 yards; first down, ball on their own 43-yard line. Anderson made one yard through his left guard. Second down, nine to go. Cooksey made six yards through left tackle; third down, three yards to go. Ball on the 50-yard line. Harrell made four yards and first down on Benson 46-yard line. Harrell made 12 yards through center for another first down.

First Touchdown.
A forward pass, Melvin to Bowles, scored a Medford touchdown. It gained 34 yards. Score: Medford, 6; Benson, 0. An attempt to back the line for the extra point failed.

Hughes kicked off to Turzinski, who returned 15 yards and was downed on his 21-yard line. Harrell made four yards through right tackle. Miller went around left end for 18 yards and first down on 44-yard line.

Blancome made 12 yards around his right end for first down. Ball on Medford's 27-yard line. Miller lost one yard at the center of the line. A forward pass intercepted by Cooksey and he was downed on his own 25-yard line.

First down, Medford. Harrell made six yards around his right end. Cooksey made nine yards through his left tackle, but the ball was called back and Medford penalized five yards for off-side. Second down, six to go. Melvin ran 21 yards through his left tackle. First down; ball on Benson's 48-yard line. Harrell made three through center; second down, 7 to go. Harrell made six yards through the center of the line. Cooksey made first down through center; ball on Benson 41-yard line.

Harrell made seven yards through his left tackle.

Second Touchdown.

Melvin ran 24 yards through his left tackle for a touchdown. A forward pass, Melvin to Bowles, made the extra point. Score: Medford, 12; Benson, 0.

Hughes kicked off to Blancome, who returned 21 yards; downed on his own 44-yard line. Miller lost one yard through right guard. Miller punted to Melvin; who was

downed on his own 23-yard line. Cooksey was thrown for two-yard loss. Second down, 12 to go. Melvin made four yards through his right guard. Third down, 8 to go.

Score: Medford, 26; Benson, 0. Hughes kicked off to Blancome, who returned 25 yards and was downed on his own 26-yard line. Blancome made two yards around his right end. Miller made one yard through center. Melvin fumbled Blancome's punt, but Medford recovered on own 35-yard line. Harrell made two yards through his left tackle. Harrell went through center for 19 yards and first down. Melvin was thrown for one-yard loss. A Medford pass was incomplete. Third and 11 to go. Gault replaced Pulten for Benson. Melvin made two yards through right guard. Melvin punted and Blancome downed on his own 17-yard line.

Blancome made 11 yards through his right tackle for first down as the quarter ended.

Fourth Quarter.

Ball on Benson's 28-yard line. Williams made two yards at center. Blancome went out of bounds after an 8-yard gain. First down, Blancome made one yard through his left tackle. Williams made two more through the same hole. Blancome ran out of bounds on his own 49-yard line, losing a yard.

Punt Blocked.
MacDonald blocked Miller's punt and Captain Morgan ran 26 yards for a touchdown. Medford failed to convert. Score: Medford, 32; Benson, 0.

Benson kicked off to Sprague, who was downed on his own 35-yard line. Harrell made two yards at center. Cooksey replaced Harrell. Melvin was thrown for a three-yard loss. Third down, 11 to go. Garnett failed to gain around his left end. Fourth down, 11 to go. Melvin punted out of bounds on Benson's 45-yard line. Williams lost two yards around his left end. Second down, 12 to go. Blancome lost one yard around his right end. Cooksey intercepted a Benson pass and was downed on his own 31-yard line. Garnett made two yards at center. Garnett failed to gain at center. Garnett ran around his left end for a touchdown, after a 50-yard run. Cooksey converted. Score: Medford, 39; Benson, 0.

Applegate replaced Anderson for Medford. Benson kicked off to Garnett, who was downed on his own 31-yard line. Stoehr was taken out and Green went in for Medford. Applegate lost two yards. Garnett lost three more yards. Third down, 15 to go. Applegate punted and ball was downed on the Benson 47-yard line. Endicott and Turzinski went in for Raikko and Williams. Turzinski went out of bounds; no gain. Miller failed to gain. Miller made three yards at right guard. Miller punted and the ball was downed on the Medford 31-yard line. Garnett lost two yards at center. After a lateral pass to Cooksey, who ran for a touchdown, the ball was called back and Medford was penalized 15 yards for holding. Second down; ball on Medford's 46-yard line. Melvin punted to Endicott, who fumbled. Medford recovered on the 50-yard line.

A forward pass, Melvin to Garnett, gained five yards. Harrell replaced Garnett. Applegate failed to gain. A Medford pass was incomplete; fourth and 5 to go. Cooksey punted out of bounds of the Benson 27-yard line.

Newlin replaced MacDonald. Blancome kicked for three yards around his right end. Bowerman was replaced by Archer. Blancome failed to gain at right end. Blancome made two yards. A Benson pass was incomplete.

Medford gets ball on downs; first and 10 on Benson 31-yard line. Benson knocked down a Medford pass. Melvin lost one yard at center as the gun ended the game.

Final score: Medford, 39; Benson, 0.
