It did go rather nicely with Thanksgiving. The High Cost of Living, the Frank's comedian show which opened at the Playhouse theater last night. The light deflection of the well known, Kolb and Bill success, set well, mighty well, with the turkey and cranberry sauce and pumpkin pie.
It taxed neither the digestion, nor the mentality nor the pocketbook of the Thanksgiving night audience, and what happier combination could anyone want in the way of an after-dinner mint?

COL. WELLS RETURNS AFTER DELIVERING MAN WANTED IN NEBRASKA

Col. C. Wells, deputy United States marshal stationed in Medford, arrived back in the city this forenoon from Portland, where he delivered over to the United States court officials Jimmy Brannon, 25 years old, who, when arrested in Medford the first of the week before, on a charge of postal robbery, waived hearing and was bound over. Brannon is under indictment in Nebraska for participation in the robbery of the postoffice at Logan, Neb.
Harrison Candler, reputed accomplice of Brannon, was arrested in Portland several months ago and at an expense of \$520 to the government was returned to Omaha. The two are alleged to have stolen \$5,700 in postal funds.

OWEN-OREGON CO. BUILDS LOGGING LINE BUTTE FALLS

BUTTE FALLS, Ore., Nov. 30.—(Special)—The Owen-Oregon Lumber Co. is constructing a seven mile logging road, southeast from Butte Falls, following up Willow creek. They are also moving logging camp No. 1 to within three miles of Butte Falls, and it is conservatively estimated that there is at least a five-year program of logging from this location.
The California Oregon Power company, after years of delay has anticipated the possibilities of Jackson county's wealthiest section and have built a power line from the Prospect sector to Butte Falls, and the town will be boasting a great white way by December 1.
After many years of patient waiting, the old-time citizens of Butte Falls feel they are on the verge of having their long-desired vision realized. With a big highway plan under construction and partly finished, that connects Butte Falls with Prospect and the Center lake highway, a scenic loop unrivaled in southern Oregon, and the logging possibilities this loop route affords, would make the most pessimistic citizen feel that the little mountain town was well on its way to become the industrial center of southern Oregon.
Another road is under construction that leads from Butte Falls via Fish Lake, Lake of the Woods and Klamath, touching the finest hunting and fishing ground on the Pacific slope.

PREPAREDNESS IS WATCHWORD DUCE TELLS ARMY HEAD

ROME, Nov. 29.—(AP)—Preparedness must ever be the watchword of any conscientious government, said Mussolini today in a letter of congratulation to Gen. Hugo Cavallero, Italian army commander.
The general has just received from King Victor Emmanuel the transmissible title of "duce."
After commending the general for the morale and the smartness of the troops when he watched at the scummer maneuvers, Mussolini wrote:
"Much has been done, but much remains to be done, since despite the sublime character of the Kellogg pact everybody—not including the homeland of Mr. Kellogg—continues to arm."

BRIDEGROOM OF NINE DAYS FOUND WITH THROAT CUT

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 30.—(AP) John Welch, 22, bridegroom of nine days, was found dead with his throat slashed with a razor in the backyard of a plumbing shop here today.
The coroner's office said it was suicide. Court of domestic relations officers recalled that after he had married Myrtle Glute, 22, of Bismillah, Wash., Nov. 21, against his father's wishes, the father made charges of theft against the girl, and she retorted with moral charges against her father. Officers thought that this trouble might have been the motive for the suicide.
