

### HUGE DAIRY BARN HIGHLAND LADDIE FARM IS VISITED

BELLEVUE, Ore., Nov. 30.—(Special)—On Sunday over 1500 people from different parts of the county were present at the opening of the big dairy barn at the Highland Laddie farm east of Ashland in the Bellevue district. Besides the county visitors at the barn opening the following states were represented: Washington, Arizona, California, New Mexico and British Columbia. All who visited the new structure were lavish in their praise of the new enterprise and much impressed with the arrangement, equipment and other improvements installed for use in the modern barn. Mr. Gordon with his head milkster, Mr. Siets, conducted the visitors through the structure and explained the various sections with special equipment, while Mrs. Gordon, assisted by Mrs. Virgil Bush, dispensed refreshments to the guests, serving generous helpings of Ashland ice cream, which was furnished by the local creamery for the special occasion. The dairy cows will be put in barn at once owing to the fact that the cold weather is at hand, and the dairy cows will be much more comfortable in their new quarters. The structure is 175 by 26 feet with an ell section 36 by 50 feet and will accommodate 74 head of cows. The concrete milk house is 10 by 31 feet on the inside and is equipped with the best dairy equipment procurable. Electric refrigeration will be added before the summer season. When in full operation this enterprise will add greatly to the general business of Ashland and will furnish the local creamery with the cream for a larger output of their products. The skim milk will be used for a large bunch of hogs. The 10 acres of gladioli which Mr. Gordon planted this year have just been prepared for the market.
