## I. DERN TO MEET TURK IN MEDFORD DECEMBER TENTH

Welcome news to Medford and southern Oregon wrestling fans is the announcement made today by Jack Wood, local wrestling promoter, that I. Dern, Salt Lake City heavyweight, will meet Hassan Mohammed, the Terrible Turk, at the armory December 10 in a main event of an interesting wrestling smoker, in which Cecil Barrick of Grants Pass will also probably appear. The match will be under the auspices of the Medford boxing commission.

The Turk is anxious to meet Dern and is fostering hopes of defeating him in two straight falls. However, if Hassan becomes a victim of one of Dern's famous airplane spins, it will be too bad for Hassan. Both men are approximately of the same weight.

In a match Wednesday night at Grants Pass, Hassan made short work of the Masked Marvel, throwing him twice in 20 minutes. This bout was the feature of a three main event card, which included Sailer Jack Wood, who threw Young Gatch of Portland, and Fred Mortensen, who defeated Young Nolan of Portland.

## PORTLAND GAME MADE NEAT SUM FOR LOCAL FUND

The Medford high school realized a neat sum for its athletic fund, as its financial share of the championship battle with Benson. The total sum was guaranteed \$1000 for expenses. This sum allowed Coach Callison to take every member of his squad, give them a ride on the train, a glimpse of Portland, and a big Thanksgiving Day dinner after the game.

The total paid admissions to the game amounted to \$8200. After the stadium rental and expenses are deducted, each school received approximately \$2600.

The statistics on the game show that Medford outclassed Benson in every department of the game, even the punting of Melvin and Garnett being on a par with that of Miller of Benson, who was supposed to out-kick the locals.

Melvin was the chief ground-gainer for Medford with 163 yards from scrimmage. Harrell, closely watched, made 94 yards, Garnett 74 yards, Cooke 19, and Anderson 2. Medford made 424 yards from all sources, and Benson 159, 192 of those were from scrimmage and 47 from passes.

## PHONE SOLO WINS INDIAN TALKIE ROLE

HOLLYWOOD, Calif., Nov. 29.—(AP)—Chief Willow Bird answered the telephone in his Durango, Colo. home, and was surprised to hear a voice command him to sing.

## BRITISH VESSEL IS GIVEN ASSISTANCE BY JAPANESE SHIP

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 30.—All fears as to the safety of the crew of the British freighter Chief Maquilla, in distress 2,000 miles at sea, were removed today when the Canadian American Shipping company, owners of the disabled craft, were advised that the Japanese freighter Montreal Maru was alongside the Chief Maquilla.

In addition, the British freighter Atlantic City and the Japanese steamer Yogen Maru were standing by.

The British Columbia Salvage company's ship, Salvage King, has left Victoria for the scene to tow the disabled ship to Victoria, but the captain of the Chief Maquilla has been instructed to arrange for a tow to Dutch Harbor, Alaska, if necessary, as the Salvage King cannot reach his ship under five days. The Maquilla is 300 miles from Dutch Harbor.

## DEATH LIST IN ARCHIPELAGO PLACED AT 130

Destroyers Bring Information On Loss of Life and Material Damage—Complete Advices Impossible, Account Wires Down.

MANILA, P. I., Nov. 29.—(AP)—Reports from four destroyers returning today from a relief expedition to the typhoon swept islands of the archipelago place the number of known dead from the storm at 130 while at least 13 persons are still unaccounted for.

Extensive crop damage has been done in almost every island touched by the typhoon and the island of Negros is estimated to have suffered property and crop damage of \$2,500,000.

Reports from the destroyers stated that the sugar, banana, hemp and rice crops suffered most severely and that though the damage was great no immediate relief measures were necessary.

No attempt to estimate the crop and property damage from the typhoon for the entire archipelago is possible because of the crippled condition of communication systems.
