POLICEMAN SHOT IN CHICAGO BAR

CHICAGO, Dec. 1. — (AP) — Policeman Thomas Geary, attached to the detective bureau, was found shot to death early today in a North Wells street saloon, which police said was owned by State Representative Lawrence O'Brien. Henry Mullarkey, bartender, was arrested for the slaying. Policeman Edward Johnson, who sat beside Geary when the shooting took place, said Mullarkey grabbed the revolver from his (Johnson's) holster and fired. Geary was shot in the head, powder marks indicating the weapon had been placed close to his ear as the trigger was pressed. No one was in the saloon when police arrived. Geary had not fallen from the stool on which he sat. His head and shoulders lay across the bar, which was red-stained by blood from the wound.

WASHINGTON — As the Democrats sit upon the ground and tell sad stories of the disaster of 1928 these post election days, it seems logical to believe that the hand of political destiny is already pointing for them to their next national leader. The showing of Franklin Roosevelt in what he described as his "elegant loss-race" with Ottinger for the New York gubernatorial throne to be vacated by Al Smith, is a significant matter. It seemed almost the only positive comfort the embattled and embaffled Democracy could find amid the ruins that marked for the party the wake of the Hoover cyclone. So far as the bystander knows, every political commentator takes that view of the situation and has already picked Roosevelt's health permitting, as the next Democratic presidential candidate.

Roosevelt Handed Upward.

It was pointed out in this column at the time Roosevelt was drafted, apparently by personal action of Smith himself for the New York governorship fight, that events seemed shaping to push this Democratic member of the Roosevelt clan to the front politically. With Smith proclaiming himself out of politics for keeps under his crushing defeat, and with Roosevelt victorious in a state which at the same time decisively denied its five times governor support for his presidential aspirations, the handwriting on Democratic wall is plain to see.

The bystander recalls that Roosevelt told him at Houston, just after the Smith-Robinson ticket had been written under Roosevelt's guidance, that in his judgment the woman vote had the answer to the election outcome. It was clear that Roosevelt was none too confident then as to what that outcome would be.

In a number of years of rather close knowledge of his political activities and thought, the Bystander has never known him to be over confident. He plays the game of politics for the sake of the game itself. His is the kind of enthusiasm for political battle that remains undimmed even in defeat. And that characteristic may be an important element of the political future.

for president in 1932 against Hoover presumably unanimously acclaimed by his party for a second term will require political courage of a high order. No man who fights with victory as his sole objective could be blamed for refusing to take a chance. Unless the bystander is utterly mistaken in his man, however, Frank Roosevelt would give little consideration to that in deciding his own course.

It also is to be recalled that the political pendulum has a way of swinging back in "off" years from the ponderous strokes of presidential elections. The by-elections of 1920 will afford a better chance to measure Democratic possibilities for 1932 than the disastrous results in 1924. At that, there is some measure of comfort for the Democrats in the fact that their senate and house casualties this time by no means measure up to the proportions of their presidential defeat.

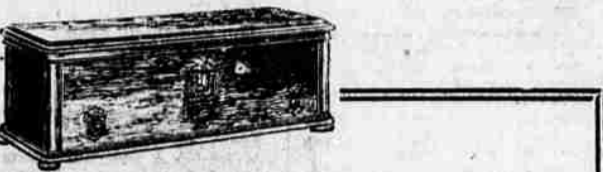
