

# CENTRAL POINT'S HEALTH CENTER OPENED MONDAY

CENTRAL POINT, Ore., Dec. 1. (Special.)—The opening of the first public health center to be established in Jackson county was held Monday afternoon, upstairs in the room over the Mary A. Mose drug store. The center was established under the auspices of the Central Point health unit, of which Mrs. Charles Taylor is chairman. It will be used as a health consultation headquarters, where all clinics will be held in the future.

The walls of the room are neatly papered and painted and are decorated with health posters, and the Vanla garments, the correct garments for children, are on display, also health shoes for little ones. The room is divided into three compartments, one will be used for undressing and dressing the children, one for measuring and weighing the little ones, and the other for the doctor's use in making examinations.

Mrs. Lydia King, county health nurse, will have regular office hours.

Miss Augusta Glover and Mrs. King, county nurses, attended the opening. Also many men and women of Central Point and vicinity, who inspected the modern equipment necessary in holding health clinics.

## CROAT STUDENTS START CONFLICTS AT CELEBRATION

ZAGREB, Jugoslavia, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Two students were seriously wounded and many others injured during the tenth anniversary celebration marking the foundation of the Trinne kingdom today, when Croatian students tore down three national flags from the cathedral and replaced them with three black flags as an expression of Croatia's disapproval of the celebration. This enraged Serbian students and resulted in open conflict. Firearms, sticks and other weapons were freely used. It was first reported that there had been two fatalities, but when the streets were cleared only wounded were disclosed.

## CRIME WAVE HITS PORTLAND, POLICE TOLD BY JENKINS

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Declaring that a crime wave was on in Portland and that the police must get immediate results in checking it, Chief of Police L. V. Jenkins, sent out an order today to officers to round up all suspicious characters.

"There is a crime wave prevalent in the city," the chief's order read. "Houses, stores, business establishments and other places are being robbed every night. Articles are being stolen. Women are being insulted by degenerates. Sneak thieves are snatching women's purses in broad daylight and on busy streets.

"Pedestrians are being held up. Drug stores, service stations, garages and delicatessens have not escaped.

"Automobiles are being stolen and used in the commission of crime."

All suspicious characters are to be investigated thoroughly.
