TURKISH OFFICIAL AND JOURNALIST VISITS IN CITY

Ahmed Emin Bey, of Constantinople, six with his wife, Madame Emin, at the J. E. McDonald home, 227 West 10th street, yesterday, obviously enjoying a typically American meal, which started with soup and ended with pie.

The penetrating dark eyes of the young Turkish official, sought with frequent consideration, the more dreamy ones of his pretty wife, thrived the conversation, carried on in two or three, different languages, with their friends, Mr. and Mrs. Harold McDonald whom they knew in Constantinople.

Emin Bey is fond of American things and things American. His Alma Mater is Columbia University, from which he graduated and carried back a P. H. D. to his native land, in 1914. He became editor and publisher of one of the largest newspapers in Constantinople, where his editorials attracted wide attention.

Following the war, when the English occupied part of Turkey, the young writer advocated complete Turkish control of the country. As a result he was exiled to Malta where he remained for two years, finally returning to his native land with an exchange of prisoners.

Asked what he did during his exile, the young boy, smiled and answered simply:

"I didn't waste my time. I read considerably— wrote some and learned to speak Italian." After his return, he entered the

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business world, and was soon appointed head of the Automobile Tire and Tractor Company of Turkey, the largest concern of its kind in that country, and in which capacity he is now serving.

That kind of work is something from which you cannot escape. It gets into the blood—you understand—and keeps calling you back. I shall return to it in the future—I hope soon. He has recently completed a book, "Turkey and the World War," which is now being published by the Carnegie Institute, and will soon be available.

They arrived in Medford on the Shasta yesterday morning to pay their friends a brief visit. Yesterday afternoon they went on a motor trip thru the valley, taking in Rogue Elk and surrounding points.

They will leave today for Klamath Falls, and will then go straight east and to return to Turkey. Their hurry in returning to their native land, was best explained by Madame Emin, who opened her purse and drew out a picture of a tiny dark-eyed boy of three.

"Home—his name—our big boy—was born in Constantinople—with his nurse and my mother." was said smiling dreamily. And his fingers were slow to release his likeness to the inspection of a stranger.

CITY EXCHEQUER FINE FATTENED

Called in for the mayor and city council is that while there was comparatively little crime in the city during the month just ended, the city court enjoyed an exceptionally good month financially, as while there were only 13 cases in the court, the fines taken in aggregated \$475. All of this money goes into the city treasury.

The monthly report of Judge Taylor lists the cases as follows: Four of intoxication, three of traffic violations, two for possession of liquor, 3 for disturbing the peace, and 1 case investigated and not docketed.

The total fines for the three traffic violations, consisting of reckless driving amounted to \$175, and the two for the possession of liquor cases brought in \$150.

MONDAY SERVICE AIR MAIL STARTS

Tomorrow is the first Monday under the new plan adopted by the Pacific Air Transport company that air mail will be carried, making a daily service of the hitherto six-day a week mail service. The new plan gives George Johnson, radio operator at the airport, the joy of working every day in the week, taking away his Monday holiday.

The new schedule was found necessary because of increasing business and is expected to be found exceptionally convenient over the Christmas rush. The volume of mail carried by the Pacific Air Transport has been found to be steadily increasing, especially over the week-ends, much of the load of which will now be borne by the Monday planes.

WELLINGTON, N. Z., Dec. 1.—(AP)—Final figures of the vote in the recent licensing referendum New Zealand give a majority of 144,325 against prohibition. The vote was as follows: For continuation of the present licensing system, 274,592; for state control, 64,761; for prohibition, 294,453.

ZAGREB, Jug-Slavia, Dec. 1.—(AP)—Students were seriously wounded and many others injured during the tenth anniversary celebration marking the foundation of the Triune Kingdom today, when Croatian students tore down three national flags from the cathedral and replaced them with three black flags as an expression of Croatia's disapproval of the celebration. This enraged Serbian students and resulted in open conflict. Firearms, sticks and other weapons were freely used. It was first reported that there had been two fatalities, but when the streets were cleared only wounded were disclosed.
